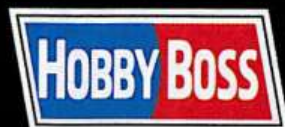

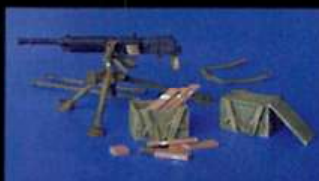

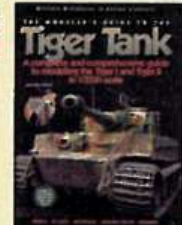

GRANTED, IT IS BETTER

Graeme Carruthers gets his hands on Academy's long awaited M3 Grant tank.

The M3 Grant was, in a simplified description, the American M3 Lee fitted with a cast turret and used in the second half of the desert campaign. British spec required that a larger cast turret be fitted to allow the radio to be moved from the hull to the back of the turret.

Until now there has only been one plastic kit in 1:35, of the Grant, Tamiya's dimensionally inaccurate and thickly detailed effort from the 70's. This is Academy's third kit in their M3 series and even though there were initial problems with the recent M7 Priest kit, Academy have tried to address some of these.

Now let's see how the Grant fairs. Unlike the first two kits which were moulded in dark green, this kit is moulded in a tan coloured plastic. If you already have the M3 Lee kit then there will be no surprises here as the sprues are just the same, both internally and externally and with the miss placing of some of the hull rivets. The M3 Lee turret is absent and a new sprue containing the new cast turret and other 'British' fittings is included instead. The cast turret

is in reality a deceptively complex shape with lots of angles and Academy have made a brave stab at it. However the edges on the turret roof look too sharp and there appears to be some issues with the angles around the right hand side of the turret hatch and on the curve of the left hand side. The turret also appears to sit too high on the hull. These issues aside it looks enough like the Grant turret that some modellers will probably be happy with it.

The fittings for the sunshade device along the hull side are particularly badly done, the kit provides you with two long strips with rectangular 'blobs' placed along its length to represent the u-shaped slots. These pieces are best discarded and either replaced with plastic card, or one of the inevitable aftermarket etch sets, or even left off completely.

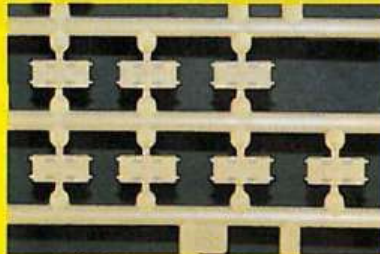
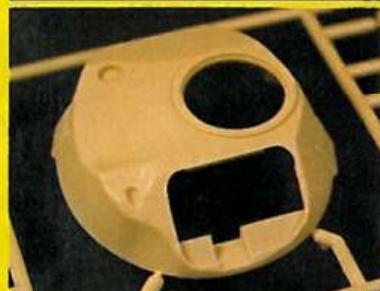
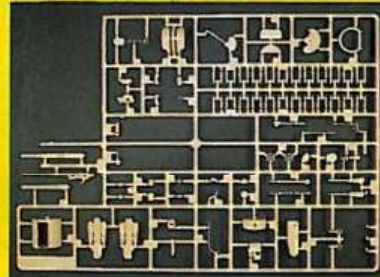
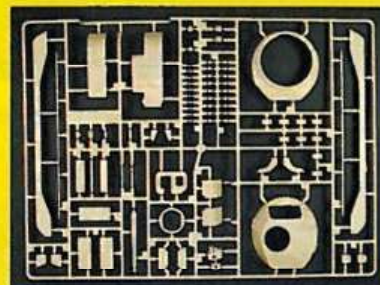
Spare track links are provided and are the WD 212 type, known as the 'double I' block, this type were the ones most commonly seen fitted to the Grant and early British Shermans. However the kit's main tracks are the plain block type produced in a very stiff vinyl, which may prove difficult to wrap around the sprockets and

sit correctly. At least they were better moulded than the dimple strewn examples that came with my M7 Priest.

The main issue modellers had with the original M3 Lee kit was that the suspension units were too tall. Academy sorted this problem in their M7 Priest kit and gave you correctly sized suspension units as one of the suspension options. Surprisingly these new correct units are missing from the Grant kit which only contains the incorrect units as found in the original M3 Lee kit. I guess this is one way of Academy making sure that you have to buy one of their M7 Priests?

Only two decal options are provided and these are from unknown units however one of the options is for a named tank, Atlanta II.

This kit is a great improvement on the old Tamiya kit but after nearly 40 years so it should be. There are some problems as mentioned above with the omission of the improved suspension units being the strangest and most disappointing. I am sure that once the aftermarket guys kick into gear then a good rendition of the Grant can be built. ■

LAST STAND AT LENINGRAD

Noel Petroni recreates a vignette depicting the bitter fighting around lake Ladoga during the battle for Leningrad.



Being the most popular tank in WWII, the Tiger surely doesn't need a historical introduction! So I'll just explain a bit of history about the diorama, which depicts the Leningrad period.

The siege of Leningrad started on 8th September 1942 and lasted until January 27th 1944. The diorama is set in the spring of 1943, during the defensive battles of Lake Ladoga where fierce encounters with Soviet troops and tanks took place. During the month of February 1943 Battalion 502 had only five Tigers operational and were numbered with one digit from 1-5. Months later fresh Tigers arrived and during the spring period, 1st company adopted a two-digit number to their Tigers. To make my Tiger somewhat more interesting I gave it a number '2' being the one digit numbering system used in February and re-numbered it '21' using the two-digit numbering adopted in the spring in which this diorama was set. I wanted the whitewash to look worn from constant spring rains with the previous number '2' exposed through the fading

whitewash. The story portrayed in the diorama is of three surviving crew-members from a knocked out panzer that have managed to make it to relative safety, while one of the crew points in the direction of where the incident took place.

CONSTRUCTION

All I can say is, wow! What a fabulous kit it is! I built the kit straight from the box, not a single aftermarket part was used...well just one...Aber engine screens. It absolutely baffles me why Dragon did not include the engine screens! The parts fit together extremely well. It's an easy kit to put together, but caution has to be taken when selecting the part to be glued, so I suggest double-checking the instruction sheet. There were a couple of instances where I nearly fitted the wrong part! The instruction sheet can be confusing since there are three different versions of Tiger that can be built and a moment's lack of concentration and an incorrect part might be glued instead.

The smoke dischargers are supplied as photo-etched parts or injection moulding. I went for the ▶



The tracks supplied in the kit are Dragon's innovative 'Magic Tracks'. These are injection moulded and have already been removed from the sprues at the factory, so it's simply a case of assembling them using the included jigs, which are designed so that they will fit perfectly around the sprockets and idlers, and have the correct amount of track sag!

The completed Dragon Tiger I all ready for painting. Apart from the addition of Aber's etched brass engine screens, the model has been built straight from the box. All of the etched tool clamps, smoke dischargers and turned aluminium gun barrel are included in the kit.



Dragon have supplied the turret mounted smoke dischargers in etched brass as well as in injection plastic. The author opted to use the brass parts. The weld seams were added using Milliput and the weld effect was created by gently pressing the putty with the tip of a scalpel.



Where the turret roof meets with the SIDES, there was a slight gap on the model. This again was corrected with the use of Milliput. Note the Panzer III style BIN, these were fitted to early Tiger I before the introduction of the standard pattern bin seen on all later Tigers.

photo etch but before I glued the part, I removed the plastic lip on the turret roof where the smoke discharger bracket sits. This is supposed to simulate welding, but is not convincing at all, so I gently removed the plastic lip with a scalpel and replaced it with Milliput. Then, with a fine pointed instrument I pressed into the Milliput to replicate the weld effect.

TRACKS

I used the 'Magic Track' supplied with the kit and have absolutely no complaints with this innovative design. They come in two separate bags for left and right sides and

are supplied loose. All you have to do is glue! Using liquid glue and the template provided by Dragon to get the proper sag for the tracks, I assembled the track in two parts. This would allow me to paint and weather the tank before fitting the tracks. The tracks, complete with sprocket and idlers wheels can then be carefully attached to the tank and the ends super-glued together. I airbrushed the tracks with Vallejo Model Air 56 and left to dry overnight before applying a coat of Vallejo Matt Varnish. The varnish will seal and protect the paint from the weathering procedure to come. I mixed CMK

SD08 & SD03 pigments to a consistency of paste and liberally covered the tracks with this mix. When the paste was completely dry, it was dusted off with an old stiff brush. Since the diorama is going to be set during the final part of winter when snow would be melting and mud would start forming in various areas, I thought a slight muddy appearance would be appropriate.

PANZER GREY & WHITEWASH

With the construction phase complete I airbrushed the model with a primer coat of Tamiya Deck Tan XF-55. After 24 hours

drying time, I moved on to select Vallejo Model Air 54 Dark Grey Blue and 52 German Grey mixed approximately 60/40 respectively and airbrushed the tank with all the tools in place. Left to dry overnight, I then painted the wooden parts of all the tools and later gave them a wash of Burnt Umber oil paint. Bison Decal BD-35022 set was my choice and I hadn't used waterslide decals for a long time. I usually use rub-on transfers or paint the numbers by hand. To apply the Bison decals I referred to MMI issue 16 where the Last Post techniques page describes how to apply decals



The whitewash scheme was applied using Gouache water soluble paint with a brush, just as it would have been on the real vehicle.



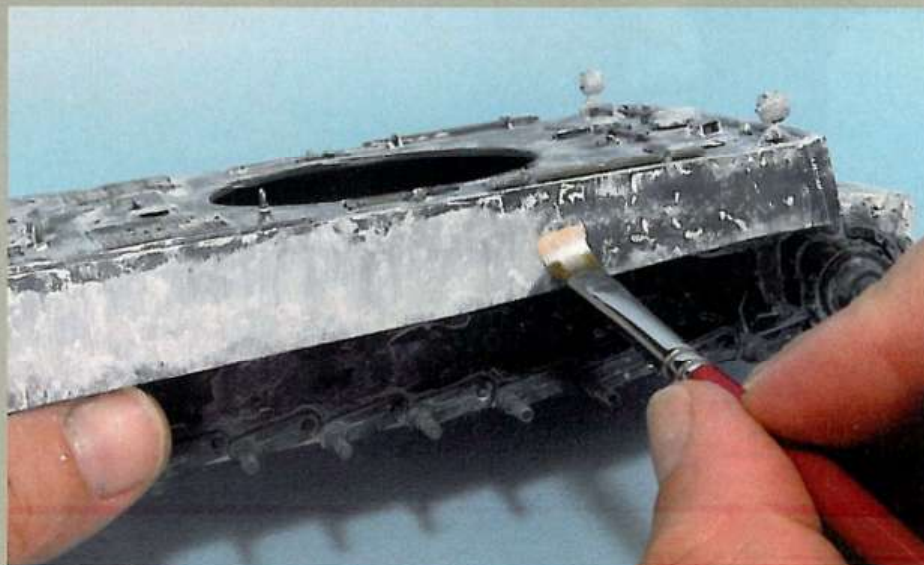
The whole model was painted using the Gouache Tempara White, on some areas the paint was applied more thickly than others. Neatness isn't an issue here, as on the real vehicles this temporary scheme was usually very hastily applied in the field and would look very scruffy.



The next stage of the whitewash effect was to start removing the excess and this involved loading an airbrush with tap water, then spraying the water at a medium pressure.



As can be seen here the airbrush acts like a mini pressure-washer removing the Gouache. The amount being removed can be varied by regulating the pressure and the time and distance the brush is held over a particular spot.



If too much whitewash is removed with the airbrush, it is simply a case of reapplying some more Gouache, leaving it to dry for a few minutes and then repeating the 'pressure washing'. This also has the added advantage of layering the weathering for a more realistic finish.



Some minor surgery has been performed on the Jaguar Models Tank Commander to get the exact pose the author was after. Note the replacement hand and the filler on the bottom of both forearms.



The commander and wounded crewman set are also from Jaguar Models. Both are beautifully sculpted and nicely cast, only a small amount of filler was needed on the joints of the arms and torsos. Note the extra tears added to the trousers by the author.

using Johnson's Klear.

Actual wartime whitewash paint was water-soluble, so that it would run off the equipment when the first rain started to wash away the snow. Some years ago I had experimented on a model with 'gouache' (poster) paint and liked the worn-out whitewash effect. So I had a basic idea of what to expect and decided to use the same method on my Tiger. The process consists of applying white 'gouache tempera' paint with a flat brush onto the model. Now, gouache is not a permanent paint and when dry will dissolve with water. So, I squeezed a small amount of Pebeo Gouache Tempera white onto a palette and started giving the Tiger a whitewash. The amount applied by brush was random as I went along, from medium thick to thick in some areas. The next phase was to airbrush the whitewash with tap water. Setting the airbrush to medium pressure, I started airbrushing water directly onto the whitewash, which starts to dissolve in an uneven pattern. You can even control the amount of whitewash you wish to remove. Since I wanted a very worn whitewash I airbrushed more water varying the distance of the airbrush. Eventually water will start to accumulate, so it would be ideal to keep the model at a slight angle so the water runs down to

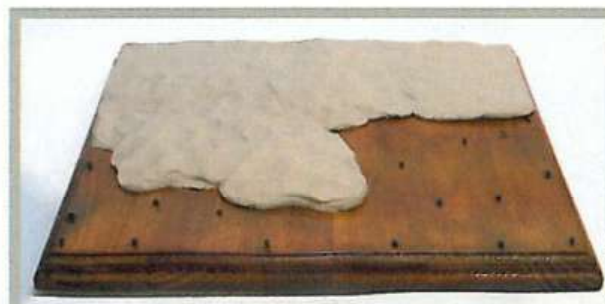
one point and can be collected with a tissue paper. If a lot of whitewash has been removed, this can be re-applied by brush, left to dry for a few minutes and the airbrush process repeated.

WEATHERING

Satisfied with the whitewash result, I was however left with a stark, bright whitewash, which did not seem authentic at all in this scale. To tone down the white, I applied a wash consisting of Raw Umber and a small amount of White oil paint diluted in white spirit. Chippings were added using Vallejo USA Olive Drab 91 and rain streaks were applied with a pointed brush using very diluted Payne's Grey oil paint. More rain and dust streaks were applied with pastel pencils using sepia and burnt umber. What I did was to mark a vertical line with the pastel pencil and with a flat brush use a downward motion to fade the pastel onto the surface. Although I can describe the weathering process in only a few words, it really takes hours of fiddling, correcting, re-applying, adjusting and placing tones and shades where needed. In my opinion, it is really worth investing time and concentration during the painting and weathering process because this is where the model comes to life! ►



The Commander and wounded crewman are in the process of being detail painted. For the flesh areas, oil paints have been used and for the black uniforms, Andrea Acrylics Black has been used as it offers a very flat finish, perfect for replicating the lusterless cloth of the uniforms.



Once an appropriate base had been picked small tacks have been hammered into the top. These will act as a key for the air-dry clay to grip onto.



Before the clay had time to harden the vinyl tracks from the kit were pressed into the clay to create the track marks to the edge of the base before carefully doing the same with the Tiger itself.



With the tracks complete the next stage was to add plaster to bulk out the areas to be covered in snow. Static grass was also stuck along the front edge with PVA Glue.

The next step was to airbrush the grasses area in a khaki colour as well as brush painting the wooden fence.



To represent the snow the author used Deluxe Materials Micro Balloons. To do this the areas to be covered with the 'snow' were first coated with PVA glue before sprinkling the Micro Balloons onto the PVA.

FIGURES

The infantry wearing overcoats are from Dragon, set 6190. They received Hornets heads and Andrea equipment. I really like these figures and especially the way the coat tails have been moulded as separate parts. The duo with a wounded leg are from Jaguar, the pointing panzer dude is from Dragon set 6347, but he received a new head from Hornet, a new left arm and some major surgery to the legs. The commander is also made from different parts with the main being from Jaguar. All the figures were painted using Vallejo acrylics and oil paints for the flesh tones. One special note on the panzer uniforms is that, I used black acrylic paint from Andrea acrylics Black NAC 02 which has more of a matt finish when compared to that of Vallejo paints.

TERRAIN & SNOW

With the wood base cut to the desired measurements, I hammered tacks onto the surface for the air-dry clay to grip onto, I then pressed a vinyl track into the clay to simulate the track marks. Plaster was added to raise



the snow area slightly and then I sprinkled static grass onto a white glue foundation, on the areas without snow. I later airbrushed the grass with a khaki colour. It was my first time attempting a snow diorama and I decided to use Micro Balloons BD-15 from Deluxe Materials. I covered the bottle nozzle with a plastic mesh and by tapping gently on the bottle the micro balloons were sprinkled evenly over the surface. I only applied white glue for the base and left the micro balloons to settle without applying further adhesives.

CONCLUSION

Well, another diorama ready for my showcase and another diorama that I enjoyed doing. The Tiger was a joy to build, hassle free, easy to put together and in a very short time as well. I prefer building compact dioramas using one main vehicle as the centre of attraction and adding figures brings the diorama to life. I believe that including many figures even on a small diorama will make it look more interesting and busy. Off to my next project now which will be a desert scene and is already underway! ■



The infantry figures all came from Dragon's Frozen Battleground set (No. 6190). The heads were replaced with Hornet items and their equipment from Andrea Miniatures.

TOY FAIR 2008



Wow, I can't believe this is my third trip to the prestigious Nuremberg Toy Fair as the Editor of MMI. We flew from Stansted courtesy of Air Berlin, on an Airbus A320. (note to self must have more airliners in the magazine, just kidding!).

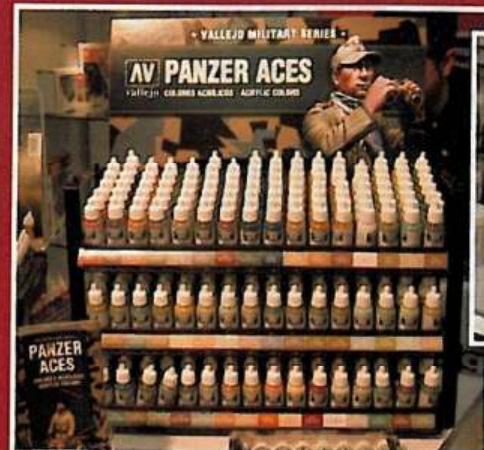

THE "GECKO"

Ian Ruscoe has fun building Italeri's quarter scale MH-60K Special Ops Blackhawk.

I previewed this kit in an earlier edition of MMI and on initial examination of the this kit thought it looked pretty good, with decent detail throughout, I reckoned it would build into a nice model of the Special Ops Blackhawk. The decal options give you two schemes, one in overall olive drab and the other in a two tone ghost grey scheme, it was this latter scheme I chose, as it looked a bit different than the standard Helo Drab most Blackhawks are painted in. However upon checking references at www.airliners.net the only ghost grey machines I could find were in fact painted in a single tone of grey, and not two tone as suggested in the instructions.

My brief from the Editor was to build the kit from the box and not get carried away with extra

detailing, for the main I didn't stray, although I was tempted with some of the minor, yet niggling problems I encountered along the way.

GETTING STARTED

Assembly starts with the cockpit and cabin, the parts fit on the whole was OK, but a few items needed fine tuning. The main omission in the kit is the large internal fuel tank, positioned across the rear bulkhead of the cabin. This isn't provided by Italeri so you'll have to build it yourself, I didn't because of my brief. After test fitting the cockpit and cabin seats I put them to one side for painting after I had tackled the rest of the interior painting. The insides of the fuselage, cabin/cockpit floor were painted in Dark Ghost Grey, followed by some

post fading in a lighter mix of the base colour. The next step was to detail paint all of the fixtures and fittings, such as seat harnesses, control columns and instrument panels etc. Once dry, a wash of Raw Umber oil paint was applied to help accentuate the detail, followed by a light dry-brushing (I know this is a little out of fashion but in some cases it's still a viable way of highlighting detail on parts). After painting and weathering the cockpit/cabin assembly and the insides of the fuselage halves, these parts were all joined together. It was at this point that I discovered that the cockpit/cabin floor part is slightly too short and over 4mm too narrow, the same can also be said for the interior roof! As if that wasn't bad enough the fuselage

halves didn't fit together very well either. It's nothing any modeller couldn't put right with a little filler and or plastic card but in this day and age I would have expected better from Italeri, as it does tend to take the shine off building the kit. After sorting these problems out, assembly continued with the fitting of the cockpit glazing, doors, aerials, in-flight refuelling probe, transmission and exhaust housings. I found that there were also fit problems with these parts as well, in particular the cockpit glazing, which is one of the reasons I built the cockpit doors closed. I replaced the support arms on the refuelling probe and upper fuselage cable cutter as these looked a little over scale too me, these were made from thin plastic card and stretched sprue



respectively. There is one glaring mistake in the instructions that tells you to fit the wrong nose mounted radar and FLIR housing, use the one shown on the box art and NOT the part shown in the instructions, the correct part is on the sprues but no mention is made in the instructions. One further point is the fitting of the cross shaped aerials on the upper fuselage, only the rear one is actually fitted to the real aircraft. The final stages of assembly concern the main and tail rotors and the ESSS (external stores support system), stub wings and external fuel tanks, these latter items weren't fitted to the model as I couldn't find any reference to them being fitted to this particular version of the Blackhawk. ►



Even though the paint scheme may look scruffy. The author has actually kept it restrained compared to the state of the paint often seen on the real thing. This light grey scheme is particularly susceptible to extreme wear.



The author added some extra detailing in the form of fine wire. Note how the subtle dry-brushing has brought out the detail incorporated in the rotor head moulding.



The tail rotor assembly is nicely detailed, the only extra detail added was the whip aerial on the top of the tail boom.

PAINTING

After masking the model I sprayed a coat of Tamiya XF-1 Flat Black over the parts to prime them, after removing a few blemishes the painting continued. As I mentioned earlier the kit instructions suggest a two tone grey scheme as one of the options but upon checking my references I found this to be incorrect, and so amended it by giving the model an overall coat of light ghost grey only. I tend to mix my own colours from the Tamiya range of acrylic paints, not because of any loyalty to 'Mr.T', but

because they were healthier to use. I don't like spraying enamels for health reasons and the excellent Vallejo Air colours weren't available twenty years ago when I got used to mixing Tamiya paints. The colour I used was XF-66 Light Grey, this was post shaded over the parts followed by a lighter mix of the colour. After picking in any detail painting by hand, the model was coated in Tamiya X-22 Clear to seal the paint and provided a glossy surface for the decals. These were applied using a decal setting solution, and once

dry the assemblies were matted down with a coat of Xtracrylix Flat varnish. The masking was removed before the weathering commenced, starting with pin washes of Raw Umber oil paint to the parts and finally artists pastel chalks. With the model almost finished, I ended up cracking and couldn't resist adding the missing cable detail on the main rotor hub in the form of thin wire, these were attached using superglue and painted to look like the actual cables, they were then dusted to blend them in with the rest of the model.

CONCLUSION

Initially I was looking forward to assembling the kit but the shine soon wore off because of the minor fit problems and instruction 'gaffs'. I'm not saying the kit is unbuildable, but just be aware of the problems, the potential is there to create a cracking model it's just that you've got to work a bit of magic with it. Even with an 'out of the box' build I'm personally pleased with the overall appearance of the 'gecko', it looks impressive. ■

Although not as sinister looking in this light grey scheme when compared to the usual Helo Drab that these MH-60's are painted in, it's still a cool looking aircraft and a great modelling subject.

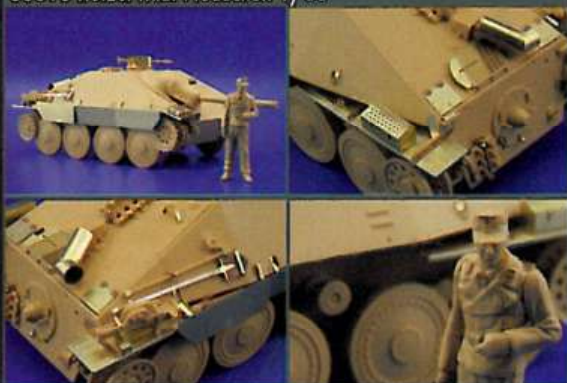

MINI MONSTER

Alex Clark builds the latest from Cromwell's Combat 72 range, the 'Mifletset'. And even in this scale it looks imposing...

The Israeli Nagmachon was developed as a counter-insurgency armoured personnel carrier and is based on the hull of the Centurion MBT. Noticeable features are the extremely thick slabs of side armour and an array of reactive armour blocks covering much of the frontal arc of the vehicle. Armament consists of a number of machine gun stations and four IS-10 grenade launcher boxes. Earlier versions of the vehicle featured three lightly armoured panels fitted atop the hull whereas later versions are fitted with a pillbox like structure (sometimes referred to as a 'Doghouse') that provides complete enclosure for the crew. This type of vehicle, also known as the "Mifletset" (Monster) is especially suited for low intensity urban conflict and as is often the case with Israeli armour, photos of the vehicle show more than one design for this structure. All versions of the Nagmachon can also be fitted with a number of different engineering devices.

The hull and running gear is (incredibly) moulded as a single piece with just the small details such as hatches, grab handles etc. provided as separate parts.

THE MODEL

The kit belongs to Cromwell's Combat 72 range and follows on from a previous release of the earlier style Nagmachon that lacks the doghouse. For those who aren't aware of this range, the models in it are all composed of just a handful of parts, but still retain a high degree of detail and accuracy. This particular kit has slightly more parts than the others in the range and this reflects the complex nature of the real vehicle. The main hull is a single piece casting with most of the separate pieces being

the delicate smaller details. The moulding is exceptional, with some incredible undercuts on the single piece hull. The details are all sharp and well cast, with just a couple of small air bubbles present - these being easily filled with a little putty. There is also some flash but again this is minimal and considering the detail of the kit I was amazed there was so little. A nice touch is that all of the crew hatches are all moulded as separate parts which will make life much easier for those wishing to add crew figures. There are no markings included, although

photos show very few (if any) marking on these vehicles anyway. The only real negative point is the lack of instructions, although a few reference photos will be enough to show where the small parts go.

Due to the low number of parts, the kit only took a couple of evenings to build. The most time consuming part involved removing the two large moulding plugs that are sensibly positioned along the underside of the lower track runs. I clipped the bulk of these off using an old pair of Tamiya side cutters and then sanded the remaining

burrs down over a piece of A4 wet and dry paper. Compared to photos the model really does look the part and all the details are present. The only additions I made were the steel wire aerials, some extra stowage and aluminium foil covers for two of the four grenade launcher boxes (some of the grenades weren't fully moulded on these). The kit does feature some stowage within the rack on the engine deck but I decided to add a little extra using thinly rolled out Magic Sculpt putty. ►



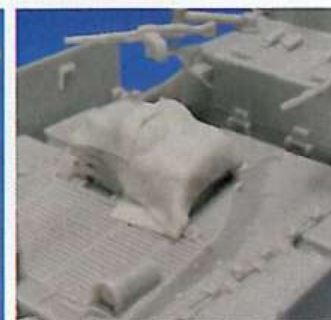
Having seen a number of photos showing Nagmachon covered in mud, I modelled this using Squadron Green putty stippled over the lower hull with an old brush.



The kit provides most of the hatches as separate items, although I only left one of them open as I intended to add just a single crew figure.



The kit includes four sets of smoke grenade launcher boxes, with two of them moulded with a protective dust cover. The grenades visible in the other two were slightly mis-moulded so I made covers for these using household aluminium foil.



Although the stowage basket on the engine deck has some stowage moulded as part of it, I decided to add some additional tarpaulins made using rolled out pieces of Magic Sculpt putty.



The whole model initially received an undercoat of Humbrol Black enamel (33) followed by the base sand grey using Lifecolor acrylic Israeli Sandgrey 1982 (UA 035). I applied this in a patchy fashion to give a weathered, subtly shaded effect.



I added some highlights on the upper surfaces of the model by mixing a little Lifecolor Israeli Sandgrey 61-73 (UA 020) with the darker base colour and applying this as a dilute mix through the airbrush. After fully dry, the model then received an overall wash of Humbrol Olive Drab (155).

The dusty and muddy areas were painted with Humbrol enamels - the light areas using Humbrol Pale Stone (121) and the darker, damp mud using Humbrol Dark Earth (29). This was followed by localised pin washes of Humbrol Olive Drab mixed with some black oil paint to give a nice shadow effect around the details.

Some subtle drybrushing using Humbrol Pale Stone helped to add some further contrast and shading to the finish. I also applied this using a small, cut down brush to represent dust on the horizontal surfaces.

PAINTING

Whilst working on this model I was sent an Iwata Eclipse airbrush to review so this provided the ideal opportunity to do this. Being a long term user of enamel paints, I also decided to try out some acrylic paints, specifically the Lifecolor brand as they include Israeli armour colours in their range and they were recommended as being very accurate.

I began painting by giving the complete model a coat of Humbrol Matt Black (33). This provides a good key for the acrylic base colours to adhere to and will act as the shadow colour for some pre-shading. I then airbrushed Lifecolor Israeli Sandgrey 1982 (UA 035) in a slightly patchy fashion to break up the monotony of the colour and to give a subtle pre-shaded effect. To add additional contrast I lightened this base colour with some Lifecolor Israeli Sandgrey 61-73 (UA 020) and lightly airbrushed this over the horizontal surfaces. At this point the model looked nicely shaded but the finish was very uniform

and clean so I gave the model an overall wash of Humbrol Olive Drab (155) mixed with Humbrol thinners. Next I concentrated on painting the muddy areas by airbrushing Humbrol Pale Stone (121), a good colour for dried mud and dust, around the lower areas of the hull and running gear. I then airbrushed Humbrol Dark Earth (29) to overlap with this to represent areas of darker, damp mud. After the muddy areas had fully dried I applied a dark pin wash using Humbrol Olive Drab mixed with black oil paint. I concentrated this around the details and recessed parts of the model, including the muddy areas. I finished the weathering by lightly drybrushing Humbrol Pale Stone over the whole model. I also drybrushed this using a small cut-down brush to represent dusty areas, focussing mainly on the horizontal areas.

To finish the model I turned my attention to the remaining smaller details. The numerous windows fitted around the 'doghouse' are tinted with a bluish-green colour on the real vehicle. As the windows

were moulded solid I just mixed up a blue-green colour using Humbrol enamels and painted these in with a small brush. I also painted the machine guns, lights and aerials. Many Israeli vehicle photos show some of the small fittings painted red, so using the photos as reference I reproduced this on the model. Finally I added the crew figure - he was actually borrowed from an Achzarit model I'd completed earlier and is from the Goffy Israeli tank crew set.

CONCLUSION

This kit is another great addition to the Combat 72 range and is a real treat for anyone interested in modern Israeli vehicles. The simplicity of the build doesn't compromise accuracy or detail and because of this the kit should appeal to both modellers and wargamers. ■

CZECH MATE

Jan Peters builds Tamiya's
'Tank Baiter' but paints it to
fight it's former owners.



I've always liked the look of the Hetzer tank destroyer, its sleek lines and low silhouette make it look like a real

hunter, like a cat on the prowl. Built on the proven 38(t) chassis it was a successful design, used right until the end of the war, and even after the war. Conceived as an easily mass produced tank destroyer in 1943, its production finally started in 1944. BMM and Skoda kept on improving on the design during production, and many changes took place, most of them to aid in faster production and lowering the cost of materials. Tamiya's model represents an early mid production vehicle, with 32 bolt road wheels, early sprockets and 12 hole idler wheels.

Now, even though I liked the Hetzer, I never got round to actually building one... until I saw a model built to represent a captured vehicle in Bulgarian service. The green Hetzer with big bright red stars grabbed me, and I instantly knew I wanted to build one. A search on the Internet turned up just one picture and a colour profile on <http://rkkaww2.armchairgeneral.com>, so information on this exotic subject is very scarce. Although the picture showed a later version of the Hetzer, I wanted to use the new Tamiya kit, as I was very curious about it. A search through the spares box turned up a Voyager etch set (PE 35009, which is intended for the DML early Hetzer) and a Jordi Rubio barrel with a threaded end. Although not ideal I decided to use both, as it would just be sitting in my spares box anyway...

THE MODEL

I must admit that I was somewhat reserved about this kit after first opening the box. The kit consisted of 'just' five sprues, two of which are identical and hold the wheels and suspension components. Closer examination turned out a well thought out design, and some very nicely moulded details.

Although some of the details are somewhat simplified, all in all it is very good indeed! The parts are cleanly moulded in dark yellow plastic, without flash, and you get a choice of both 'link and length' and rubber band type tracks. The only thing really missing from this kit is a fret of photo etched parts, for the intake grilles and Schürzen armour plates. The 'link and length' tracks

have some small ejector pin marks to be dealt with, but nothing serious, and they are very well done with moulded in sag.

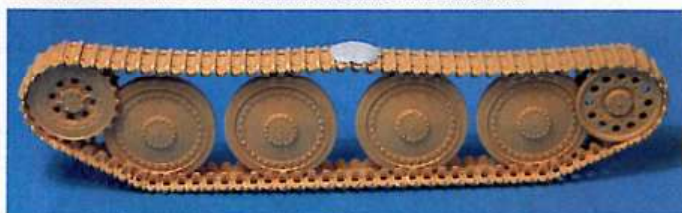
GETTING STARTED

Construction starts with the lower hull and suspension, and immediately it becomes clear this is a well engineered kit. Fit is excellent and the running gear is constructed in such a way it can be built up, and taken off the vehicle for ease of painting, if you wish to do so. Make sure you do not glue the return roller (part A11) in place, or you'll have a hard time taking the wheels and track subassembly off of the lower hull. You guessed it... I didn't and had to take extra care when taking it off and putting it back on during painting and weathering. The suspension is articulate by the way, so you could place the vehicle on rough terrain, although you wouldn't be able to use the 'link and length' tracks provided. An assembly jig is supplied to make sure all arms line up correctly, so that all wheels will touch the track.

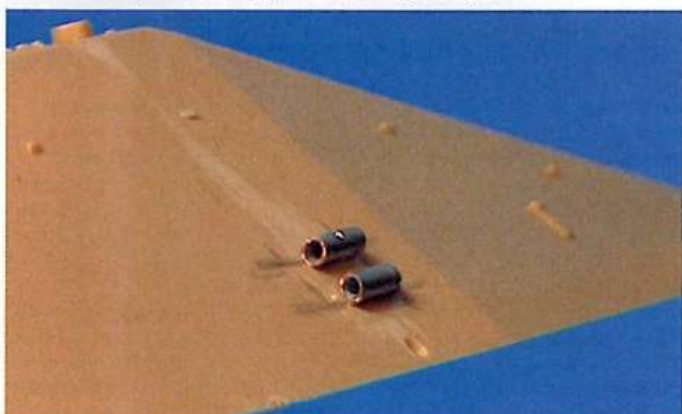
Up next is the upper hull. The first thing I did was to remove some of the moulded-on detail, such as the antenna tubes on the side of the hull, these parts are moulded solid on the kit. These were replaced by small brass tubes, so an antenna could be fitted later on. One front fender was removed, and the Notek light was left off, and changed for an old Sd.Kfz. 251 headlight. A electrical lead was made from thin wire, and the lens was taken from a PHS aftermarket set. Construction is very straightforward, and again fit of parts is very good. I'm sorry to say the etched parts did not... as they were designed for the Dragon kit (kit number 6030) the fenders are too large for the Tamiya kit, and as such unusable. Please note that this has nothing to do with the Voyager set, which is very good indeed. But that is what you get for being a cheapskate, not willing to fork out the extra money to buy the proper set.... Luckily for me the fenders in the Tamiya kit are very well done, and I only thinned the edges with a file for a better scale appearance. Clamps and fittings were replaced by Voyager items, and some Eduard 1:48 tool clamps which are more to scale, and to me more importantly, a one piece design rather than the three piece affairs by other manufacturers. Periscope guards were taken from the Voyager set, as well as the intake grille and the plate that slides underneath it. This is a very nice part, and it fitted the Tamiya intake very well. Several wing nuts



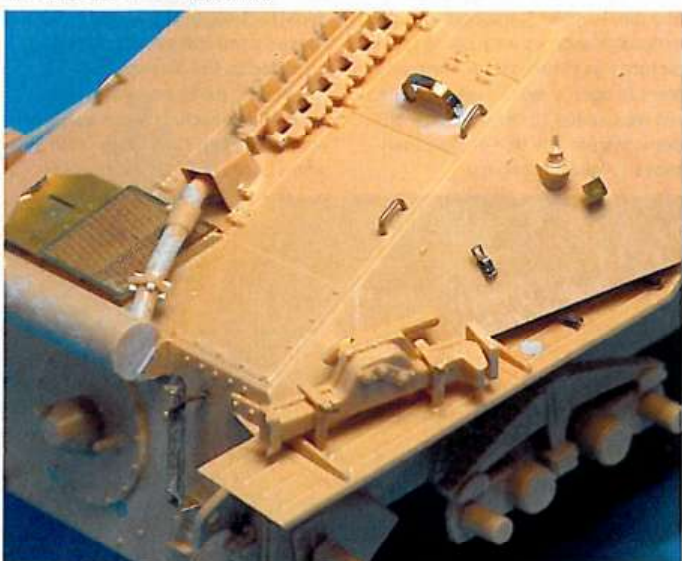
The kit's mantlet received a casting number, which was carefully slid from one of the sprues. Mr. Surfacer 500 was used to boost the subtle cast texture on the Tamiya parts.



Tamiya supply the tracks in both vinyl and link and length injection plastic. The link and length tracks incorporate the distinctive track sag, where as the soft vinyl tracks would be better if making the most of the articulated suspension and displaying the model traversing uneven ground.



Tamiya supply the spare aerial holders as solid mouldings, the author carefully carved these parts off and replaced them with thin brass tubing.



The Engine grille mesh and sliding cover came from the Voyager etched detail set designed for Dragon's early Hetzer, fortunately the parts fitted perfectly over the Tamiya grille.



The author's Hetzer is now ready for painting and as the model has been detailed with etched brass and an aluminium barrel it is essential to give the model a primer coat prior to camouflaging.



The model received a coat of Tamiya X-18 Semi-Gloss Black to prime the surfaces prior to adding the camouflage colours. Using a semi gloss paint ensures a smooth surface for the following colours.



As the author wanted to have some of the original German camouflage showing through the Russian green, he first airbrushed on patches of Vallejo Model Air Sand (028).



Once the sand was in place Vallejo Tank Brown was airbrushed to finish off the camouflage pattern. Vallejo Black-Grey was applied to the gun barrel to represent the heat resistant coating.



Vallejo Russian Green was airbrushed on very thinly so the original German three colour just showed through.

were taken from an Aber set, as these are better than the ones from Voyager. Some of the tools were left off from the vehicle, as this was a captured vehicle. I reasoned that some of these were taken away from the vehicle by locals or soldiers before it was put into service again. The same goes for the Rundumfeuergerät on the roof. It was assembled without the MG-34, and the armoured plates were replaced by items from Voyager. Bolts were added with the aid of a hexagonal punch and die. I added some bolts to the exhaust flange as well, using some pictures as reference. An antenna from Dragon's old German antenna set was added to the hull side, to demonstrate the use of the small tubes I replaced earlier.

The gun mantled received a casting number, shaved from a kits' sprue, and the cast detail was further enhanced with some Mr.Surfacer 500. The Jordi Rubio barrel turned out to be much too long, and I ended up cutting off nearly an inch to make it look right. I suppose I could have used the plastic onpiece barrel provided in the kit, but I liked the look of the threaded end on the aluminium barrel.

Assembly of the Schürzen armour was the last part of construction on the agenda. For these I used the excellent parts provided in the Voyager set, as the plastic parts are way over scale. The brackets were soldered on, as this can take more 'abuse' when handling them. Superglue

would come off while bending the brackets to their final shape when mounting them on the hull. I marked the place of the mounting brackets on the hull, and drilled some holes. Small lengths of 0.5 mm brass wire were then glued in place, instead of the plastic rod provided by Voyager, as I felt this to be more of a sturdy assembly. Make sure you leave more wire sticking out than is actually needed, as it will make final assembly a lot easier. The rest is then clipped off when the skirts are in place. The washers and nuts are included in the etched set, and they are very nice. They come with a 0.5mm hole in them, so they slide over the wire, making them look like the real deal once in place. They were used on all of

the pins, including those without the armoured plates. The washers and plates were then put aside, to be attached after the painting had been completed.

PAINTING IT ALL

As usual I started the painting process with a layer of Tamiya X-18 Semi-Gloss Black. This acts as a primer and pre-shade in one, and, the semi-gloss being nice and smooth, helps to achieve the desired satin finish on the layers of paint that follow.

As this is a vehicle that has been painted in the field I thought it would be a good idea to put some of the original colours underneath, and let them show through the green. I subsequently sprayed some patches of Vallejo



The red star was applied by first making a template from thin plastic card before airbrushing with Vallejo Model Air White.



By first spraying the star white will guarantee the red will be nice and bright. spraying the red straight onto the dark green would have resulted in a very dull and lifeless colour.



The Vallejo Model Color Red has been used to fill in the star. The Model Color paints are thicker than the Model Air therefore offer a much better first coat coverage when being brushed on.

Model Air Sand (028) and Tank Brown (041), and the barrel was picked out in Black-Grey (056) to resemble the heat resistant primer that was often used on them. After this a coat of Vallejo Russian Green (017) followed. I left the exhaust in dark yellow, and a piece of spare track was held in front of the (empty) spare track bracket, so its outline shows in dark yellow on the rear plate of the vehicle. Sadly I messed this stage up a bit, as the original colour doesn't show through as much as I had anticipated.... a lesson to be learned for a next build!

For the stars I made a plastic card stencil, using a US star decal as a cutting guide. The stars were then sprayed on the hull in white and filled in by hand with red. Reason for this is the fact that red is a difficult colour to get good coverage over the green base. Later I went back over the white edges with a 000 brush, to make them look entirely hand painted, just like the stars on the real vehicle in the original picture.

Fading was next, using 502 Abteilung oil paints. I put some small dots of Faded Dark Yellow, Luftwaffe Yellow and Snow White all over the surfaces, blending them with white spirit. Doing this in a vertical motion will give the model a nicely faded, somewhat streaked appearance. To make the colour richer and more varied I used more white on the sides, and the yellow tones on the front plate of the vehicle.

Small paint chips were added using the same red-brown and sand colours I had used under the green coat. I found that Vallejo Model Air is an easy paint to use when chipping, as it is nice and thin, making it ideal. I kept the paint chips to a minimum, indicating a freshly repainted vehicle, rather than a tank that looks like it has been used for decades. Some streaking with the green base colour was done to make the large sides look more attractive, this is

a fairly simple way of breaking up larger surfaces.

Pinwashes were done with Rembrandt 'Van Dyke Brown' - a very dark, almost black-brown colour and 502 Abteilung 'Wash Brown' to give the Hetzer contrast, and simulate dirt and grime that had accumulated in the recesses. The same 'Van Dyke Brown' was also used to simulate small chips and oil stains on the hatches and wheels. For this I put some small dots of paint on the subsequent surfaces, and apply a liberal amount of white spirit. The white spirit lets the paint disintegrate and the pigments will form small clusters of chips. You can influence this process with a damp paintbrush, moving the chips to where you want them. After drying the effect is very convincing.

Detail painting is next, the headlight was picked out in dark yellow and the spare track links on the roof received a dry brush with dark grey over the green, followed by a wash of 'Burned Brown' and 'Dark Rust' Tensocrom. The exhaust was left in dark yellow during airbrushing, and now it was time to give it a rusty appearance. I started by stippling the exhaust with Vallejo 'Dark Rust' and 'Yellowish Rust' from a 'Panzer Aces' set. These paint sets are very useful, as they contain some good colours for painting and detailing panzers. Over this I used some Tensocrom Burned Brown, Dark Rust and Light Rust, again very useful sets. The Tensocrom gives a nice varied colour to the exhaust, exactly what I was looking for. To finish it all I used some real rust particles, mixed with matt varnish (how real can you get?) and some 'smoke' pigment from the Mig Productions range. To simulate a leaking gasket I put some more of the 'smoke' pigment on the exhaust tube, and directly underneath it, on the engine deck.

The tracks were treated with subsequent washes of Vallejo Model Air Black Grey (056) and ►



With the basic painting completed, the next step was to add some scuff marks and scratches to represent where the German sand colour has been exposed. This colour was mixed from Abteilung's Snow White and faded Dark Yellow oil paint.



Here we can see where the author has replicated where one of the spare track sections has been removed since the vehicle has been painted in the green used by its 'new owners'.



The tyres were painted in Lifecolor Tensocrom Smoke, which the author reckons is a great colour for replicating black rubber parts. The rims of the wheels have been painted in Humbrol enamel to simulate where the tracks guide horns have rubbed against the rims.



A combination of oil, enamel and acrylic paints have been used to complete the detail painting and weathering on the track assemblies. Remember to add the polished metal enamel colours last as further oil paint/white spirit washes can easily lift these Humbrol metallic colours and ruin the finished effect.



The standard Notek light was substituted for an older style head lamp from an Sd.Kfz. 251 half track. Note how the oil paint dust washes have realistically highlighted the recessed weld seams on bow plate.

Tracks Primer, again from a Panzer Aces set. Both were thinned with distilled water, and applied directly over the semi-gloss black undercoat. The guide horns, the parts of the tracks that come in contact with the ground and the rims of the wheels were painted with silver Humbrol enamel, to represent the polished steel caused by the contact between the wheels and tracks. The rubber tyres were painted with Tensocrom Smoke, as this gives a very nice black finish, exactly like rubber. Another way to get this effect is painting the tyres flat black, and rub some Mig Productions Smoke pigment over them, though it is a more long-winded approach.

Time to get dirty now, my favourite part of the weathering

process. Migs' Dark Earth and Dry Mud pigments were mixed with Golden texture gel, which is comparable with Mig's acrylic resin which can be found at good art shops. This mixture was used on the lower hull and chassis, to simulate caked-on mud. After drying for 24 hours this turns into a rock hard surface, on which you can continue weathering. To make the mud tones more varied I gave it some washes of 502 Abteilung Basic Earth and Wash Brown.

At this stage the tracks and wheels were glued in place on the model. I did this so that the weathering on both subassemblies would be consistent. The Schürzen armour was glued in place as well, and the brass nuts and washers received an undercoat of Humbrol

Flat Black, followed by the Russian green base colour.

Sand and Earth coloured Tensocrom were used as a pre-dusting, before the final weathering with pigments was added. I applied a liberal amount on the lower parts of the vehicle, concentrating on the fenders, Schürzen and running gear along with some on the roof and engine hatches. The layer on the roof and engine deck was then chipped with Russian green again, to simulate scuffs and scratches made by the crew entering the vehicle.

To finish it all off, a wash was applied consisting of Mig's Dry Mud pigments mixed with white spirit, and after drying the excess was removed with a stiff dry brush. Make sure you leave some in

the recesses as this gives a very realistic effect to the vehicle.

The Hetzer was finally fixed to a black oval shaped base, to make it stand out nicely, without any distraction from the model itself. A nameplate was fixed to make it clear to others what this model represents, as it is quite an exotic subject.

CONCLUSION

This was a very enjoyable build. The Tamiya kit is very good, and it quickly builds into a nice model, even when built out of the box! Note to self: don't be a cheapskate, and buy the right photo etch set next time!

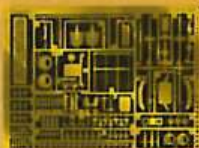

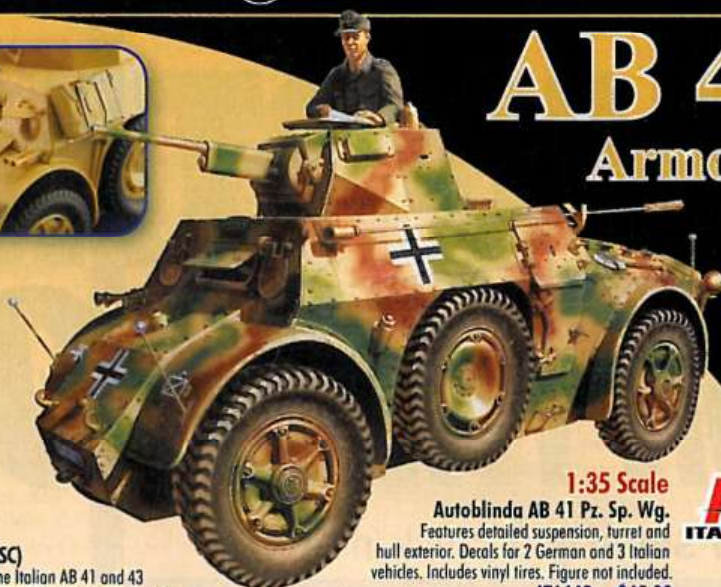

MORTAR ON THE MOVE

Kev Smith gets stuck in to Dragon's second version of the M2 half track.

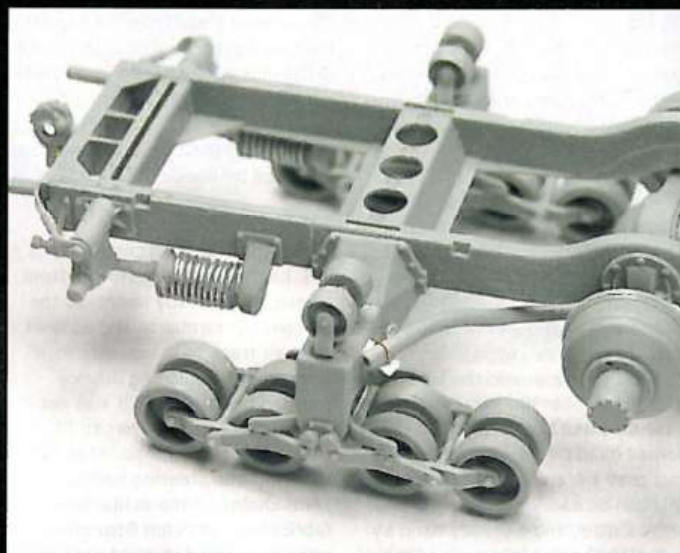


Coming hot on the wheels of the M2/M2A1 the mortar carrier kit borrows heavily from the original with almost all the M2 in the box including the weighted tyres. Only the rear deck being new which incorporates a new floor section with a mount for the 81mm mortar, a new rear panel and door. Dragon has produced some beautiful moulded ammunition bins for the mortar which incidentally is supplied with a turned aluminium barrel. An etch fret that we have come accustomed to from Dragon is included in the kit, this includes the light guards, radiator louvers, mud flaps and windscreen wipers. All the makings of an excellent kit, but not a quick build as the it contains nearly 400 parts! Now it was time to see how well it all goes together. As a relative novice to Allied armour I really didn't know what to expect but with the release of the M2 and the favourable reviews it received I couldn't wait to crack open the box and get started. So armed with the TM -Tankograd Technical Manual Series books (6010 & 6099) by Michael Franz I was ready to begin.

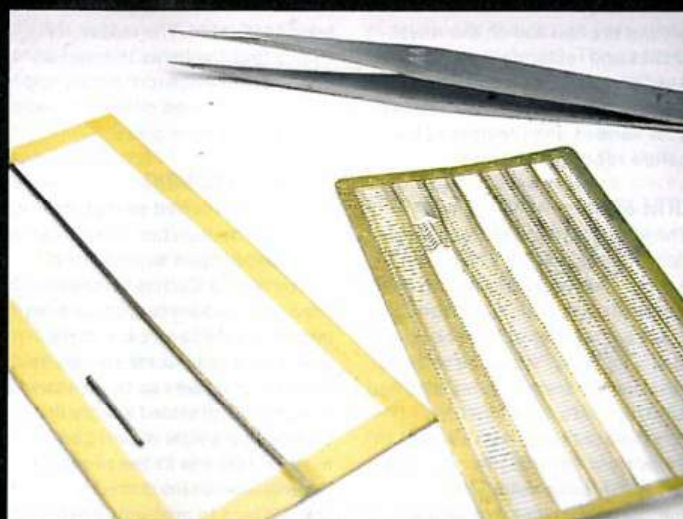
GETTING STARTED

The engine was first, I decided to build it without any extra detailing as I wasn't going to have the bonnet opened up and the engine on display. Though for anyone

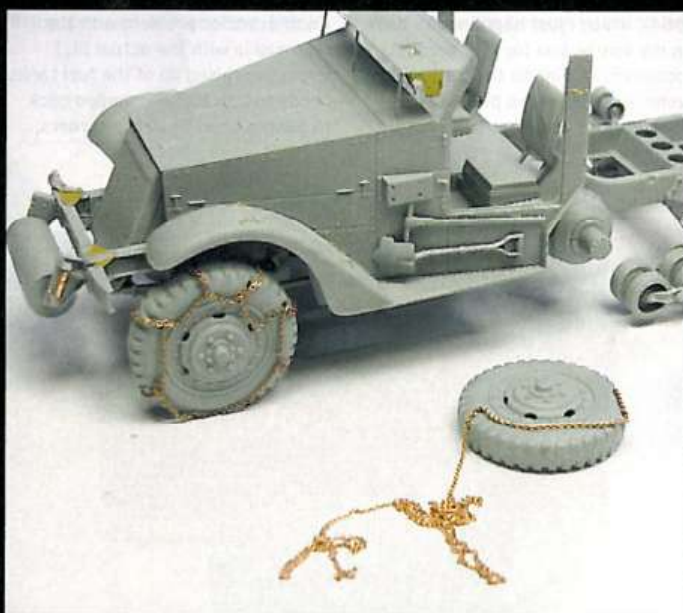
wanting to super-detail the engine bay you have a great starting point. Next came the drive chain, no real problems here, but I have to say the strut that braces the two bogies would not fit without some minor surgery, in hindsight I could have replaced this with plastic rod! I did add some drain holes to either side of the bogies these were made with disks of plastic card which were glued into position then left to dry. I then drilled these out using a slightly smaller diameter drill to get the distinctive 'lip' around the edge of the hole. The other addition was to make a bracket from plastic and thin wire to hold the exhaust pipe in place. Dragon has used their slide mould technology to create a set of very impressive drive sprockets and rear idlers. The road wheels and bogies are made up from twenty parts, some clever design has gone into these to make the construction relatively easy. I wasn't happy with the solid moulded springs on the rear idler adjustment mountings, so I removed the moulded springs and replaced them with thin solder. The un-ditching roller was next to receive a little extra work. This comes in two halves and care must be taken to conceal the join lines with some gentle sanding, I also decided to replace the two large springs which are moulded onto the chassis mountings with some new ones fabricated from copper wire. ▶



The kit's Idler wheel tensioner spring was replaced with soft solder wire. The exhaust pipe also received a new mounting bracket, this part was missing from the kit.



The many tiny tie-down loops were fashioned from etched brass parts. Note the small jig on the left used to be able to shape lots of the tie-downs in one go. By making a jig like this saves the author a lot of time.



Fine copper chain was used on the front wheels to replicate the snow chains often fitted to U.S. half tracks to aid traction on soft, wet or frozen ground. Note the fine copper wire used to detail the un-ditching roller



◀ THE CAB

Moving onto the cab. With the help of some clever colour coding in the instructions it made the positioning of all of the gear levers and other details straightforward without the worry of getting these tiny parts mixed up. The only things missing from the cab area are the drivers foot pedals, so I scratch built some using plastic card but these are scarcely visible on the completed kit and could be over looked if you wish.

A noticeable flaw in the kit is with the armour plating, Dragon have moulded these fixings as domed head rivets, when in actual fact they were domed head screws, this can be easily corrected with a Micro Chisel, and a steady hand by inserting the slot into each of the screw heads. Another improvement was made by carefully removing the moulded tie down points around the hull and on the wheel arches and replacing them with Aber photo etched items. I also carefully removed the moulded-on door handles and remodelled these before repositioning them.

LITTLE BITS

The jerry cans that are mounted on the outside of the cab doors are moulded in one piece with the can, strap and the mount. They look good as they are but could look a lot better with a bit of extra detailing, so I removed the moulded on straps with my Micro Chisel and replaced these with etched items from Eduard. The next item to receive some extra work was the .30 cal machine gun with a M35 cradle, this is really very nice indeed but I couldn't resist fitting an Armorscale brass barrel (B35-064), which I just happened to have in my spares box for just such an occasion. Moving to the back of the vehicle, I used tread plate decals from Archer Fine Transfers to add

the missing tread from the top of the rear light mountings. These are waterslide with a raised tread plate pattern, and should be treated in the same way as any other decals, the only difference is that they are attached before painting.

WHEELS AND CHAINS

Unlike their German counterparts, U.S. half tracks had powered front wheels, this greatly improved the off road performance and allowed the half track to manoeuvre in terrain that would bog down a German half track. So it was not uncommon for the crews to fit snow chains all year round to help with grip and steering control. The snow chains on the model were fabricated from Lion Roar chain and super glued straight onto the tyres. The headlight guards which are supplied on the etch fret were left off until after the painting had been completed. The reason for this, is that the lights themselves come with transparent lenses and would have proved difficult to paint with the guards in place.

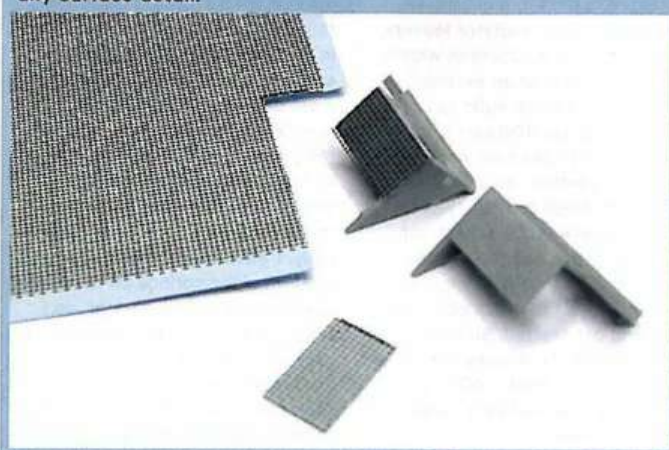
FIGHTING COMPARTMENT

Inserts are provided so that the large side ammunition lockers can be modelled open, exposing the mortar ammo. Each is completely filled with packing tubes that even include detailed end caps, there would have to be some surgery to open these lockers so Dragon have thoughtfully provided a score line to make life a little easier. Care must be taken to fit the two large internal ammo bins correctly, or this will lead to problems when attaching the sides. There are some ejector pin marks on the rear wall and the door that need to be filled. Another minor problem with the rear wall is with the actual fit. I found the raised lip of the fuel tanks needs to be carefully sanded back to allow a snug fit at the corners.



Tech Tip!

Archer Fine Transfers, new Treadplate surface detail set was used to add the missing tread plate. This waterslide decal is applied in exactly the same way as any waterslide decal. Micro Set and Sol can be used to settle the decal down and conform to any surface detail.



The radio is nicely detailed as it comes in the kit and only needed some thin wire adding along with a better detailed antenna base from Armorscale (S35-001). The other area that could cause some problems is with the fitting of the machine gun skate ring, there are a number of location points that fit onto the side armour, the problem again lies with the internal ammo bins, and if these aren't fitted correctly the rail won't fit between the bins and the side walls. This I found was best tackled with some careful dry-fitting before committing myself by adding glue.

FIGHTING COMPARTMENT FLAW

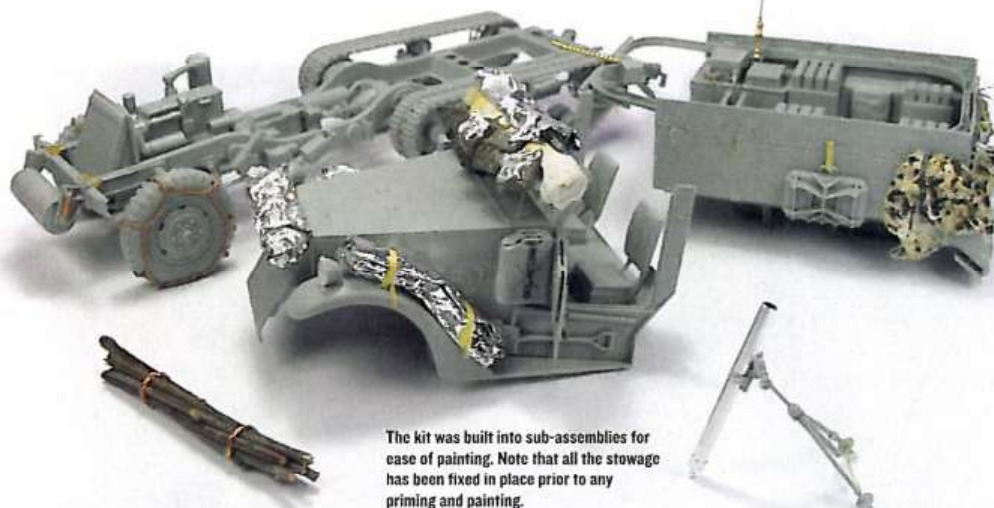
The second major and most disappointing problem by far is with the internal layout of the fighting compartment. On production vehicles (M4A1), the base plate for the mortar was raised and reinforced, there was also a plate installed with spaced holes that ran in an ark to place the tripods feet into, which would run the full width of the rear to allow a greater traverse of the tube. The two eight round magazines that are mounted to the rear of the vehicle were removed and the seats were relocated. Two

large external bins were attached to the rear to accommodate the ammo removed from the crew area, a shelf was also fitted below the bins, this is all clearly visible in the TM book 6099.

The model represents a very early mark of vehicle, and not the M4A1 which were common to the European theatre. The mistakes can be easily corrected with some relatively simple scratch building using plastic card. Why didn't you? I can hear you ask, because I got carried away with the build and didn't realise until it was too late, maybe next time!

MORTAR

The 81mm mortar that comes in the kit is nicely presented by Dragon, the tube comes in two turned aluminium parts allowing the tube wall to be the correct scale thickness. The mortar was originally intended to be fired from the ground and mounted on the vehicle for transit, and only to be fired from the vehicle as a last resort. A base plate is also

included in the kit so if you wish to model the mortar in the ground role you can.

STOWAGE

Take a look at any footage or photographs of Allied armour and particularly the half tracks and you will see that they are covered with stowage of all descriptions. Stowage is an integral feature if you are modelling Allied vehicles, you have the choice of commercial products or scratch building your own stowage. I chose to incorporate both, using the Tamiya Allied Vehicle Set (No 229) and fabricating some tarpaulins and bed rolls from kitchen foil and tissue paper. I usually try and paint my models with the majority of stowage in place, I find that doing it this way keeps the continuity of the painting. It also helps with the overall natural look of the model and does not look as if it has not been added as an after thought! I started with the cam net, toying with the idea of draping the netting all around the sides of the fighting

compartment, but decided against in the end as I thought this would be too much. As you can see from the finished model I settled to cover the rear only. The netting is straight forward, I use book binding web, but medical bandage can produce the same results, by soaking either in a solution of PVA glue and water, the net can then be moulded into place. The netting can be enhanced further with tea leaves and thin strips of tissue paper attached whilst the net is still tacky.

The idea of positioning the crews packs and other items over the windscreen came from a photograph in one of the reference books I used for this project. For the sheeting I used a combination of tissue paper and kitchen foil finished off with securing straps cut from Tamiya Tape, the crew bags are from the Tamiya Allied Stowage Set.

PAINTING

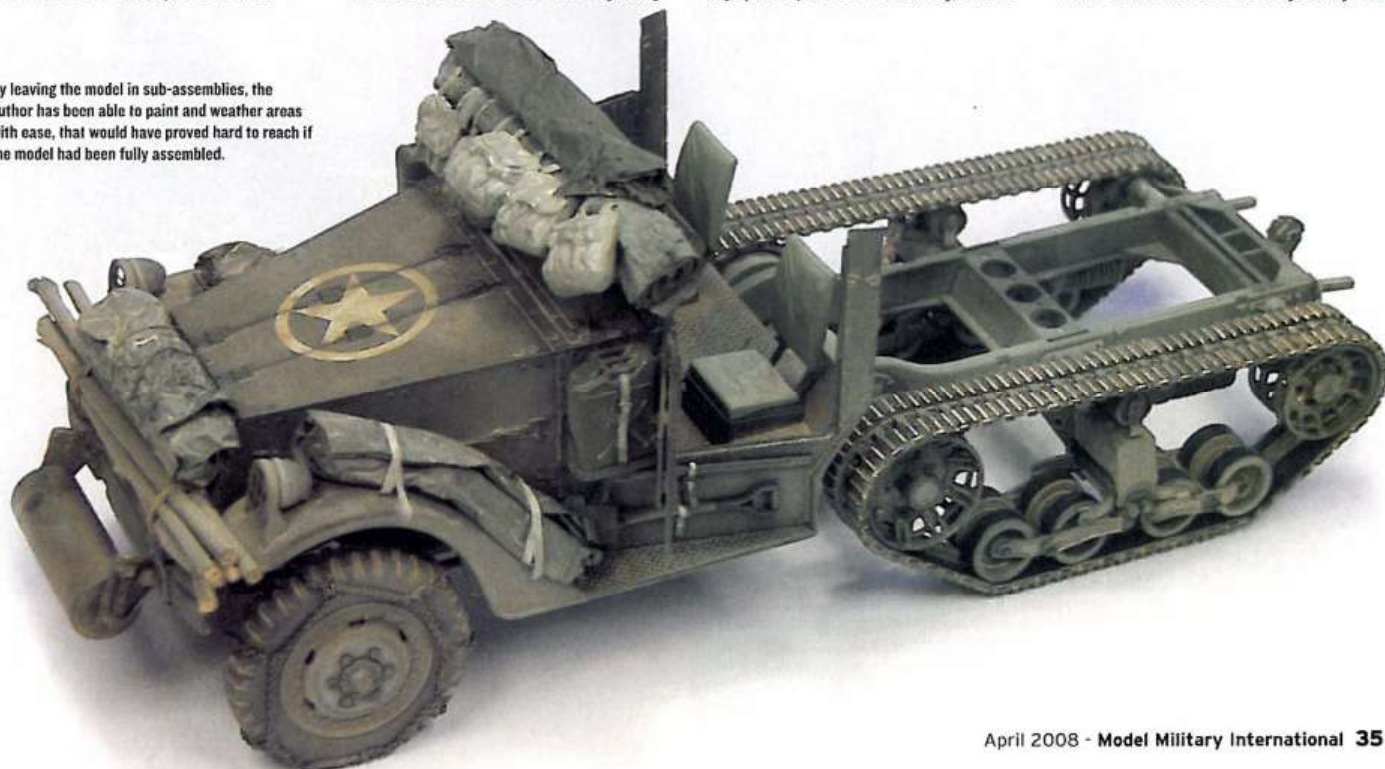
For me this is by far the most enjoyable part of modelling, this is

the time that the plastic, etched brass and resin that you have been toiling over on the work bench up and till now, starts to come to life.

For ease of painting the kit was kept in the three sub assemblies, consisting of the chassis, cab, and fighting compartment. This proved particularly helpful when it came to painting the cab area, where it would have been very difficult to paint the dials and detail the dash area if the model was in one piece. With so many different mediums used on the model, plastic, brass, aluminium and in this case tin foil it is important to have a tough base coat to work on. I always use an automotive primer as this sprays and covers very well.

After the undercoat was left overnight to dry, the M4 was ready for the first coat of Olive Drab. In my minds eye I had an idea what I wanted the finished half track to look like, from my reference pictures I could see that most of the dirt/dust collected on the flat surfaces to the rear of the vehicle. With a fine line between getting the

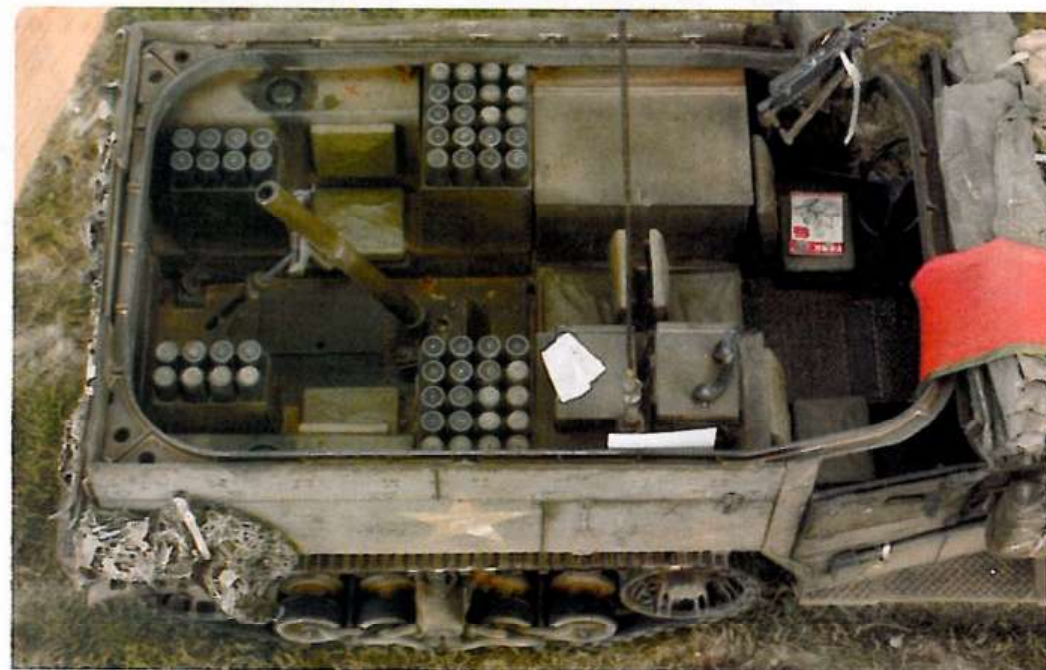


◀ effect just right and going too far, I decided to gradually build up the layers of dust.

OLIVE DRAB

I started with the whole model receiving a thinned coat of Tamiya Olive Drab (XF-62), this was sprayed through my Evolution airbrush 1.5 bar I was keen to bring life into an otherwise monotone finish of Allied Armour, So I lightened the Olive Drab mix with some Tamiya Yellow Green (XF-4) concentrating on the centre of all the panels. This worked well for the internal areas, but by the time I had finished weathering the external areas this effect was hardly noticeable. The next stage was to apply the decals, it's important that these go onto at least a satin surface, this ensures that when the decals dry out you are not left with a silvery effect around the edges. I use Micro Set/Sol solution which comes as a two part system as is designed to avoid the nasty silvery effect which can often happen when applying decals onto the surface of a model.

With the decals sorted out, it was time to start the weathering. A wash of Humbrol Light Earth (119) and Mid Stone (84) enamel paint was prepared in a plastic container, the pigment was taken from the bottom of the tins with a cocktail stick then thinned to a milk like consistency. I began with the inside of the fighting compartment, there are lots of areas where the dirt/dust would collect, for example the locker tops particularly under the skate ring for the .30 cal, around the radios, and on top of the fuel tanks, in fact any areas where

movement by the crew would disturb the dust. All flat surfaces received a wash from the mix, then using a clean brush and clean white spirit, the excess wash was carefully removed from the areas most effected by the movement of the crew. This process was repeated a number of times until a convincing build up of dust was achieved. It is important that the edges are feathered in to remove any 'tide marks' when dry. The tops of a number of the ammunition tubes

were kept clean to suggest that the vehicle has recently undergone an ammunition replenishment. Finally to add a little colour and interest a pin-up poster was stuck to one of the ammo bins, happy with the results I moved onto the cab area, where exactly the same techniques were employed.

TRACK PAINTING

I painted the tracks in a faded black colour before adding a polished metal effect to the guide horns and running surfaces of the drive sprocket and rear idlers with a soft lead pencil. After a little gentle persuasion the finished road wheel assemblies were fitted in

place. The exhaust was next, and was painted with Vallejo Salmon Rose (835) acrylic paint, and then patches of Vandyke Brown oil paint were randomly applied all over the exhaust before being left to dry. Washes of various browns were then applied, before a final dusting with Mig Productions Light Rust (PO23). With the chassis finished I could finally attach all the sub assemblies together before adding scuffs and scrapes around the tops of the hull sides and around the edges of the external lockers. This was done by first applying Winsor and Newton art masking fluid with a sharpened cocktail stick, followed by a couple of very light coats of Thinned Tamiya Buff (XF-57). The masking fluid was removed with fine tipped tweezers, this process was repeated a couple of times to gradually build-up the layers of dust and vary the freshness of the scrapes. Finally to finish off, some U.S. Army digging tools and a role of barbed wire from the spares box were attached to the vehicle along with an air recognition panel cut from lead foil.

BASE

The base started life as a picture frame. The groundwork is a mixture of filler, PVA glue and static grass that was left to dry overnight, and then sprayed with various browns, followed with a light scattering of static grass finished off with random dry brushing of different shades of green starting with the dark shades. Once dry the odd stone was picked out with Humbrol Khaki Drill, these were enhanced further with pin washes. After the basic

groundwork was finished, the final job was to add a light dusting of Tamiya Buff to marry the vehicle and the groundwork together.

FIGURE

I used the U.S. Tank crew in winter #1(35033) from the excellent Alpine range, and painted with Humbrol enamels and oils.

CONCLUSION

Looking back over the build I found it to be an enjoyable project, certainly there are oversights with the screw heads and tyres. But the biggest and most disappointing one is that Dragon have got the configuration wrong. The remainder of the kit is well done, the moulding and fit are especially good, and I am looking forward to their future releases. ■

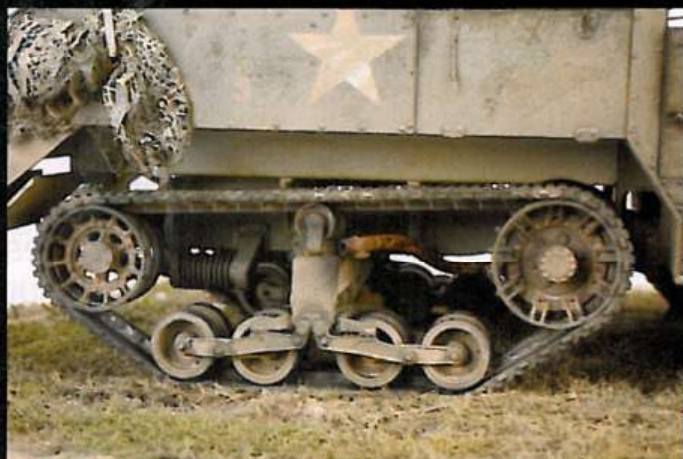

LEND LEASE LORRY

Graeme Carruthers sings the praises of ICM's all new Studebaker 2.5 ton truck, definitely a model that's been long overdue.

The Studebaker truck was a perfectly good vehicle that wasn't adopted by the US Army as they decided to concentrate mainly on the GMC Deuce and a half, (as in the excellent Tamiya kit). The Studebaker US6 did however go on to be used by the Allies as part of the Lend Lease programme and was largely used by the Russians very successfully. Not only was it a good transport vehicle, but the Russians found it was an excellent platform to mount the Katusha rocket system on.

The kit contains six sprues and a separately bagged piece for the cab roof. The sprues come in various shades of grey and are for the most part well cast and contain many fine parts, such as very delicate windscreen wipers, that will need some careful removal to ensure they don't break. There is a small amount of flash present, especially on the front grille pieces but it will be easy to deal with a swipe of the file. The front

grille should have the Studebaker logo embossed on it as per the box art but the kit part is just a plain plaque. (possibly a copyright issue?)

A full engine is provided and looks pretty good but it can be detailed up with wire if you choose to open up the truck's bonnet.

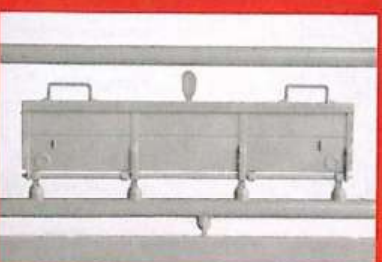
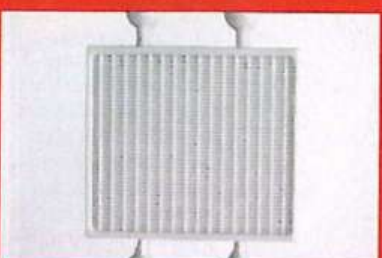
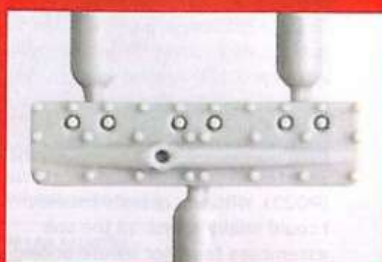
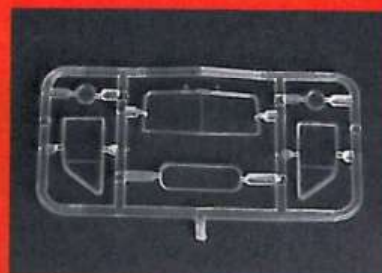
The rear cargo area has the options for the seats to be in the raised or lowered positions. The woodgrain detail in this area is worth noting as it is very subtle, not over done and should look in scale if carefully picked out in the painting stage. The rear area covering frames are nice and thin but do suffer from mould lines.

The tread pattern on the tyres should be offset down the centre as is seen on the examples on the box top but the tread on the kit's wheels are symmetrical. There is no easy way to correct this and replacement will need to be sourced.

The cab area is

nice detailed with no sink marks found on the inner surfaces except in an area that will be hidden by the seat. The dials are represented as moulded details that you can paint or decal if you wish. The steering wheel is particularly fine and has nicely moulded scalloped grip detail on its rear surface.

This is a vehicle that a lot of modellers have been waiting for a long time and apart from the wheel tread problem the kit will build into a great looking truck. At the time of writing, Azimut of France have jumped on the aftermarket bandwagon and announced a Katusha conversion. Highly Recommended ■

Graeme Carruthers takes a look at Dragon's latest and rather unusual release, the Heuschrecke IV B 'Grasshopper'.



AH, GRASSHOPPER!

This is definitely one vehicle I thought I would never see a kit of, never mind a kit in plastic!

This is one of those mad ideas that the Germans came up with, a tank that can remove its own turret, haul it around on a trailer or place it in a fixed position. Go figure? Not surprisingly only three of these were built with one surviving at the Aberdeen Proving Ground in the US and this must be the vehicle that Dragon have used as the basis for the kit.

Within the box you will find new sprues for the Heuschrecke, suspension from the recent batch of Panzer IVs, one from a Stug III G and one from the Hummel/Nashhorn. Top this off with a sheet of etch, infantry gear from Dragon's Gen 2 figures, clear periscopes and a set of handed Panzer IV 'magic tracks'. The decal sheet is small and contains only four crosses, however wartime images seem to show the vehicle unmarked.

Recent Dragon kits have pushed the boundaries of detail and moulding and this kit is no different. The main turret piece has walls that are delicately thin, the track guards have superbly crisp detail on both the upper and under sides and the tools with their moulded on clasps have to be the best I have seen, (remember the days when we thought the Tamiya Panzer IV tool set was the best thing around?). Slide mould technology is seen in abundance on this kit and so is Dragon's technique of adding lots of mouldings pips. Love them or hate them, I think it is better for the modeller to have to cut these pips of than to have injector marks in annoying places that need filling and sanding.

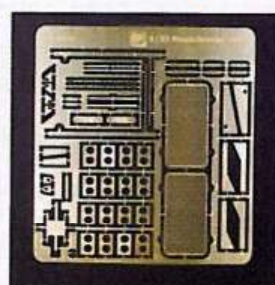
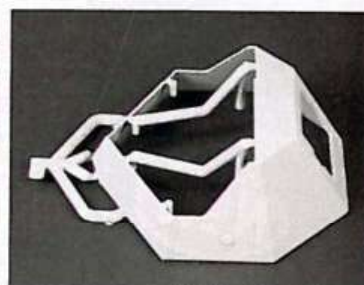
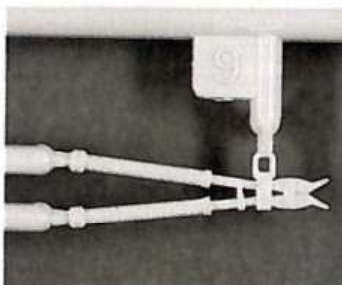
As the turret is open topped Dragon have provided an interior for the main body of the Heuschrecke, however there isn't any interior provided for the driver/radio operator's position so if you are wanting to show

the turret removed then the empty area will be obvious. Also missing is the winch and pulley system seen on photos that allow the turret to be lifted out of position and placed on to its trailer, this is a shame as a huge diorama potential has been lost. The magic tracks provided are beautiful and have well moulded, thin, open guide horns but all the photos from the war and those of the surviving example show the vehicle fitted with closed guide horn tracks.

Apart from the already mentioned missing areas which shouldn't be an issue if you build the kit with the turret in its normal position, this is a great kit of yet another obscure German subject.

On a final note I was discussing the kit with a German friend who pointed out that Heuschrecke is actually a 'Locust' not 'Grasshopper' which is Grashupfer, oh well, what's in a name?

Highly recommended. ■





THE DOCTOR GETS A PASTING

Matt Edwards takes a look at Dragon's second King Tiger to feature moulded zimmerit.

Well it was only a matter of time before Dragon updated their premium edition of the Porsche Turreted Tiger II by giving it a zimmerit texture as they had done with their production turreted version.

Some in the modelling world have had a few niggles about the moulded-on zimmerit, but I think they have done a splendid job. Yes - you will have put some effort into representing a chipped and damaged look and some areas need care when attaching certain items around the side of the turret, but I think that is being a bit pedantic on a model of this class.

So what do you get for your 'money'? Plenty - that's the answer! The box is packed with goodies, 798 which I counted!

There are several sprues in grey styrene, into which have been moulded the main kit items. All of the details are fine and crisp as we have come to expect from this company.

You will also find two clear sprues, which contain the episcopes for the driver's and the bow gunner's station and the commander's cupola, two styles being supplied.

Situated within a recessed black tray is a turned aluminium barrel, pre-folded engine grilles, wire for the head light, four metal

tow shackles and a metal aerial. Two lengths of braided wire are included to represent the usually supplied plastic tow cables; the use of these add extra realism, the ends of which are to be fitted into plastic eyes that have been slide moulded hollow.

There is no need to purchase an aftermarket brass detail set as the one contained in the kit is more than adequate.

Incidentally, if you do not wish to use the tool clamps from this set, there is a set of tools with plastic clamps already moulded on. All of the weld seams are exquisitely well created and the designers at Dragon have really done their homework here.

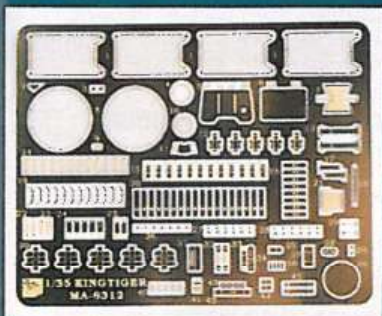
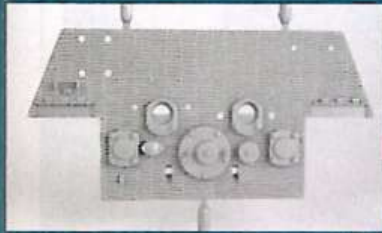
The instruction sheet is of the photograph type, which some people struggle to use, so careful study during the assembly sequence is required. The markings are printed in well defined colours

by 'Cartograph' for six vehicles. Details for where the markings are to go and paint schemes are printed in colour on the last page of the instruction sheet.

The kit scales up well to the references I have and the fit of parts is good. A little bit of filler is needed on some of the larger parts, where the zimmerit surfaces mate together. Having said this, it is a minor detail.

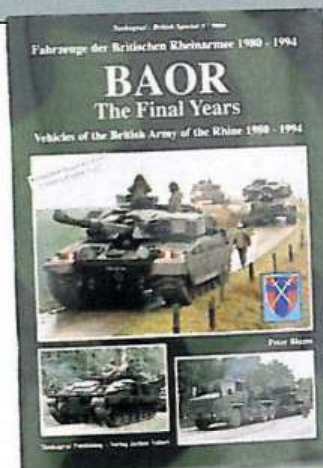
Dragon really have provided us with a kit that should keep you occupied for many hours, with good detail along with the added bonus giving very good value for money as a saving is made on any extras you might normally purchase.

I am looking forward to the next vehicle that will be given the zimmerit treatment as this is a wonderful kit that I can highly recommend. ■

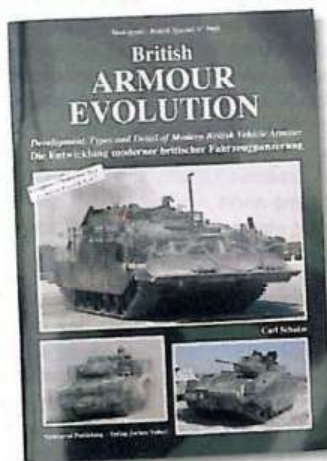
The latest batch of books from Tankograd are definitely a real treat for fans of Modern British armour. This edition covers the final years of the British Army of the Rhine (BAOR) the book as the title states covers the period from 1980 to 1994. As we have come to expect from this series, the first few pages cover the Order of Battle (ORBAT) and the final disbandment in 1994 with the closure of some 21 barracks.

The book covers the whole spectrum of vehicles deployed by the army, from Chieftains and Challenger 1's to 432's and Warriors along with the numerous artillery, engineer, REME and various support vehicles.

All but one of the photos are in colour and all are a decent size and nice and clear. A couple of my favourite pictures include the series III Land Rover wearing a tailor made cam-net coat and the disabled Challenger 1 which has thrown a track being towed by a (CRARRV), the thrown track and side skirts have been piled high on the engine deck (perfect diorama material). The book then moves on to cover the use of appliqué armour and finally the 'bar' armour which has been recently fitted to vehicles operating in Iraq and Afghanistan. This book is full of fascinating photos which are great not only for details but the weathering they suffer from while operating in such harsh environments and extreme heat. If for example you have any of the bar armour detail sets for the Warrior and Challenger 2 from Accurate Armour, then this book is an absolute must for inspiration. 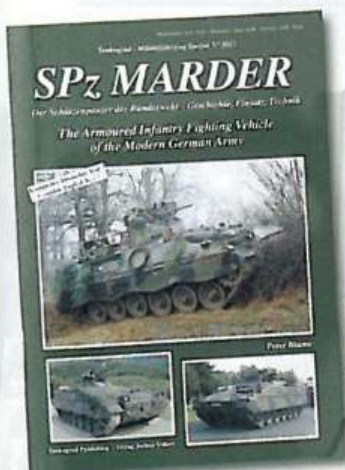

Having recently watched the re-runs of Michael Palin's program 'Full Circle', where he visits all the countries that make up the rim of the Pacific ocean. In one episode he visits the border between North and South Korea and explains that officially the war has never actually ended and some what cynically explains the situation. So when this latest title from Tankograd turned up via Book World Whole Sales, I found it to be fascinating, as I really didn't appreciate how many US troops are stationed in South Korea and more amazingly how many North Korean forces are stationed above the 38th parallel. For instance the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (North Korea) spends 20-25% of its GNP on the military and has the third largest army in the world with over one million personal and another 4.5 million reservists. Within 100 miles of the border it is estimated that some 700,000 North Korean troops 8,000 artillery pieces, 2,000 tanks and some 60,000 Special Forces are amassed and facing them are some 35,000 US troops!

The book contains an excellent selection of colour photos featuring the whole range of US vehicles deployed to protect this border and of particular interest are the Strykers which are deployed without 'slat armour', so if you want to model one on active duty and can't face the thought of adding one of the etched brass slat armour sets, why not pick one patrolling this vital border. This edition offers a fine study of modern U.S. vehicles and armour deployed along this often forgotten yet important border.

You then get to the bread and butter of the book which is the 47 full page colour profiles ranging from when the Panther was introduced in 1943 to the end of the war in 1945 and both on the Eastern and Western fronts. Each colour profile comes with a brief description in English and Polish. The profiles are nicely done and cover the plethora of schemes seen on Panthers from early Ausf A and D's up to the Ausf G's both early and late. This is a very inspiring book, not only if you are a Panther fan but also on page 30 if you are a German Armour fan in general. A couple of my favourites are on page 7, an Ausf G of the 1st SS Panzer Division in the Ardennes Offensive with the 'disc scheme' on the turret and an Ausf G of the 25th Panzer Grenadier Division in the East of Berlin in the distinctive striped camouflage. You also get a bonus decal sheet containing a lot of the markings and numbers depicted in the profiles in 1:35, 1:48 and 1:72 scales which is a nice touch. Overall a great little release from Kagero especially if you have a Panther in your stash and lets hope for more of the same.

E-MANIA

Jan Peters gives us the low down on Trumpeter's 'paper panzer', the E-25.

These are strange days for modellers, strange but good! Recently a lot of models appeared on the market, which we never would have dreamed of being released in injection moulded plastic. Dragon, Trumpeter and Tristar are putting one exotic release after another on the market, making the old expensive resin kits in your stash look crude, and devaluing them instantly. The paper panzers are very welcome, as this subject has long been neglected by the mainstream manufacturers, other than the E-100 and Maus that were done by Dragon many years ago. The release of the Trumpeter E-25, and the E-10 that followed

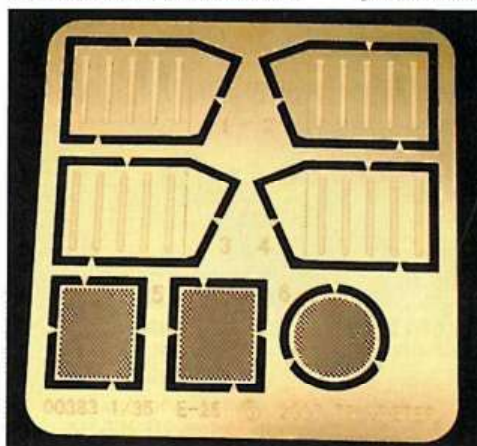
it, have caused a real E-mania in the modelling community, the E-panzers are being built all over the world, and are all over the modelling websites.

The Trumpeter E-25 is moulded in light grey styrene and comprises of 'just' 142 pieces. Tracks are included in both individual links and vinyl one piece belt type tracks. There is also a small etched fret included, holding parts for the fenders and engine deck grilles. Decals and a full colour painting and marking guide complete the package. The parts are cleanly moulded, with hardly any flash and show some very nice details. You are given a choice of two different

engine decks, one with and one without a fan assembly. There is also a choice of superstructure roofs, with one option looking very much like the roof of the late Jagdpanzer IV and the other including a small AA turret, making it look very futuristic. The only strange thing is that it seems to be missing

the aiming equipment.... Both of these options are clearly marked out in the instructions. The photo etched parts are a bit crude for my liking, but still are very useful for detailing the engine deck. I especially liked the individual track links that are provided, they are very crisply done, with just some pin-marks on the inside of each link to take care of, but nothing too serious. Another thing missing are some schürzen to hang on the sides of the vehicle. Trumpeter have moulded brackets for them on the hull, and I suspect some Hetzer or Panther style schürzen would have been used on them if it had ever reached production.

All in all, this is a very nice kit, and it should build up into a nice, somewhat exotic vehicle. The best part of course being that this is a paper panzer, and as there is no reference to how it would have looked you can let your imagination run free. Almost anything goes when it comes to painting and finishing this model, making it a refreshing break from intensive detailed projects. So if you are in need of such a break, or you want to build something out of the ordinary, then this is one kit to look out for, highly recommended! ■

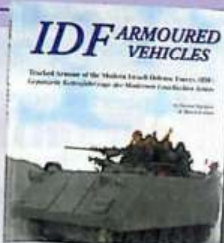
RECOMMENDED READING

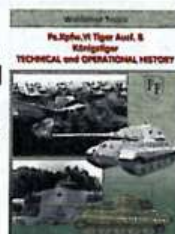

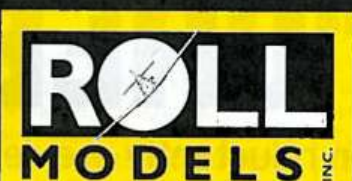

THE "CHEETAH"

Darren Thompson reluctantly previews Dragon's new release of a vehicle he has been scratchbuilding for the last couple of years.

This is the latest in what hopefully will be a long line of Dragon 38(t) variants and this time it's one of my personal favourites. The Flakpanzer 38(t) has been offered in 1:35 before, both as a full resin kit and, more recently in injection moulded plastic from Alan. This new Dragon offering is thankfully leagues ahead of them both.

As you'd expect, much of the hull and running gear with the exception of a new set of roadwheels are taken from Dragon's previous 38(t) releases, namely, the 38(t) Ausf. G and the Aufklarungspanzer 38(t), with the addition of a new three-sided tub and separate rear panel. The upper hull is made up from impressively thin walls, which gives a really good scale effect, no thinning of the upper edges here, the drop down sides are equally thin and with the fine bolt and rivet detail included, you'd be hard pushed to improve on this. The engine deck panels are also separate parts, allowing them to be shown open and this time there is a full engine and radiator assembly included. As well as the engine, a driver's compartment and transmission are also included, both of which can be viewed, to a limited extent, through the kit's open hatches.

There's also a lot going on in the rear fighting compartment, the main gun pedestal is very well handled, being a multi-part assembly, with all lower ammo stowage compartments being open and of full depth, just like the real vehicle. A pair of radios grace the front of the compartment, with multiple parts for the racks, transformers, junction boxes and the radios themselves, making for some excellent detail definition.

A spare barrel box is included, with the spare barrels moulded in-situ, should you wish to display the box open and there are additional ammo racks, crew seats and stowed MP40's to complete the look.

On the outside, Dragon have supplied a full complement of tools, with separate etched clips, which all mount on a finely moulded pair of fenders.

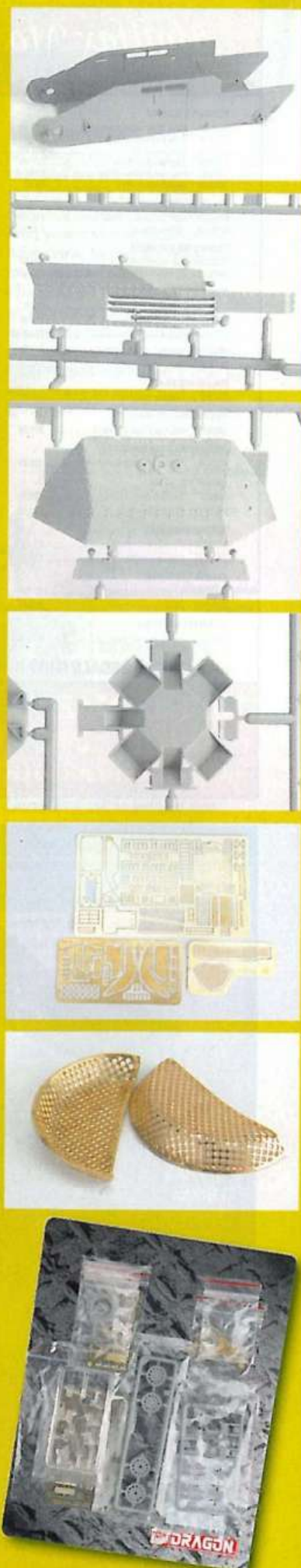
The 2cm Flak 38 is also one of Dragon's previous releases and is a nice little model in itself. It's not strictly speaking, the correct version for the Flakpanzer 38(t), as all the images I have seen show a later configuration of the gun fitted. Unfortunately Dragon haven't included all these late features, such as the embossed hand wheels and late gun sight, so if these things matter to you, you will have to source them

elsewhere, or do a little scratch-building. As before, the elevation comes in the way of four preset options, which you have to choose at the start and, once built, can't be changed. Etched brass is again included, for many of the small hand-wheels, the gunners' armoured shield and the spent shell basket.

Another oversight on Dragon's side is not to include the solid drive sprockets, without the lightening holes. These are seen on all the images of this vehicle that I have seen to date, with the exception of the early factory shots. Even the options given in the decal sheet have this feature! There are other kits out there that have these solid sprockets, as well as aftermarket ones, so it's not a huge thing to change them, but I think they really should have been included.

Decal options are given for six vehicles, all serving in France, with a variety of camouflage schemes, the most striking being the splinter style scheme of the 21.Pz.Div. vehicle, in Normandy.

With the exception of these minor niggles, this should make up into an excellent representation of this strangely handsome little vehicle and with a little work, could be a real stunner. ■

BATTLE GROUP BACKBONE

Jason Bobrowich offers us the latest instalment on the Canadian Army's Leopard tanks deployed in Afghanistan.

As the temperature rose in the spring of 2007 in the Kandahar Province, Afghanistan, so did the intensity of combat team and battle group operations involving Canadian troops.

Ground combat brought the Canadian crews in their Leopards face to face with the Taliban both in close quarter engagements and the never ending threat from Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) and anti-tank mines.

The Squadron faced not only the Taliban forces but also the ever-increasing temperature during the spring and summer that took its toll not only on the

Leopard tanks but also on their crews. Temperatures reached an unbearable 60 degrees Celsius in the tanks during summer combat missions, yet the crews showed extreme perseverance battling on through this extreme heat.

Several stopgap solutions to combat the effects from the heat on the crews and tanks were introduced including tan coloured thermal cooling blankets made of a plastic and nylon material which were attached to the turret and hull in order to reflect heat away from the tank. A variety of coloured civilian camping coolers were also issued to the tank crews to keep liquids a bit cooler, turning

the tanks into even more of a gypsy battle wagon with an ever increasing amount of kit attached to the turret.

The 'A' Squadron tank crews fought hard during their tour and the tanks continued to battle on. Main gun engagements occurred at ranges from as short as 40 feet and out to 1500 metres with 105mm High Explosive Squash Head (HESH) rounds. A number of tanks struck IEDs, anti-tank mines and even the local Afghan lorries. These were affectionately known as 'Jingly trucks', so named because of their garish paint schemes and the amount of trinkets and tassels hanging from them. All

of these elements contributed to suspension, MEXAS armour module, main gun barrel, and mine plough damage. A tank mounting a mine plough was struck on the glacis plate by a Taliban 82mm rocket and a 107mm rocket hit a Badger AEV. There was no hull penetration but as a result all tanks mounting ploughs, dozer blades, or mine rollers received additional armour on the glacis plate.

Not without very important mention is the use of the two Leopard ARVs (Armoured Recovery Vehicles) and the four Badger AEVs (Armoured Engineer Vehicles). These vehicles proved their worth in combat operations,

recovering damaged tanks under fire and clearing obstacles for both the armour and Infantry. The Badgers operated up front with the lead tanks. The Badgers sustained small arms fire during numerous operations and one was even hit by a Taliban 107mm rocket on the excavator arm while at a Forward Operating Base. More than once the Badgers were used in the recovery role for disabled tanks.

'C' Squadron, Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians) mounted in their new Leopard 2A6Ms relieved 'A' Squadron in September 2007. The battle proven Leopard C2 MEXAS still fights beside the Leopard 2A6M providing critical support with the dozer blades, mine ploughs, and mine rollers. The Leopard 2A6M has engaged the enemy with the massive firepower of the 120mm very effectively.

The Canadian tank crews in the Leopard C2's and the Leopard 2A6M now fight side by side as the backbone of the battle group in an era that not too long ago was thought by some to be obsolete for tanks. The Canadian tank crews have proven very worthy of praise and have shown the devastating results of having tanks on the battlefield to the enemy. ■

◀ The upper rear deck of call sign 11 while stopped at a Forward Operating Base. Note that the rear hull driver's tool bin has been ripped off and the variety of kit carried on the turret. This tank had an IED strike on August 5, 2007 and sustained minor damage but no injuries to the crew.

▶ The thermal cooling blanket covered Taurus ARV, call sign 1BE, is seen following up the tank Squadron in August 2007. Attached to the rear deck is a complete Leopard I power pack. The Taurus has a C6 machine gun in a ball mount on the left front and another mounted on the crew commander's hatch ring.



▶ Mounting a dozer blade, call sign 12B, lead a combat team in June 2007 into hilly and rocky terrain. The tank carries the LAV 3 tow cable on the rear hull for quick access during recovery operations.



▶ A crew member's view from the turret of a mine roller mounting Leopard C1 after detonating an anti-tank mine or IED in February 2007. Note the crater and the dirt thrown up on the mine rollers, barrel, and mantlet.



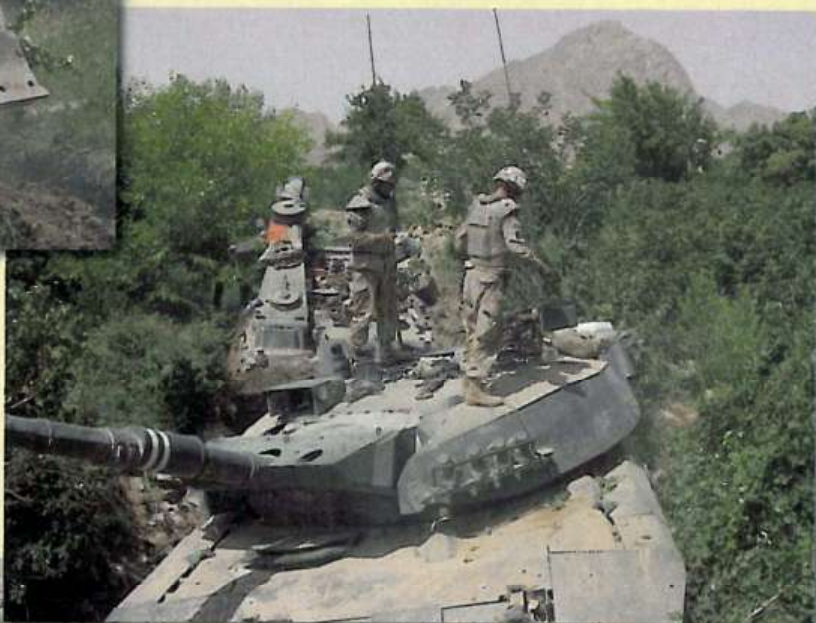

▼ The clearly visible bumper sticker applied to the driver's toolbox on call sign I2B stands for "I Love Alberta Beef". The Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians) is based in Edmonton, Alberta. Alberta is a Province in Canada well known for their very tasty beef cattle. Note the thinner LAV 3 tow cable attached to the right tow hook. The tow cable was used for both the recovery of lighter vehicles and to assist in pulling the track back on if it was removed for repair or if it was damaged.



▲ The crew of call sign I1C have just completed changing the left track in July 2007. Note how worn the track pads are on the right track compared to the left side. Clearly visible on the turret is the tan coloured cooling unit and folded combat stretcher strapped to the back of the left turret bin.

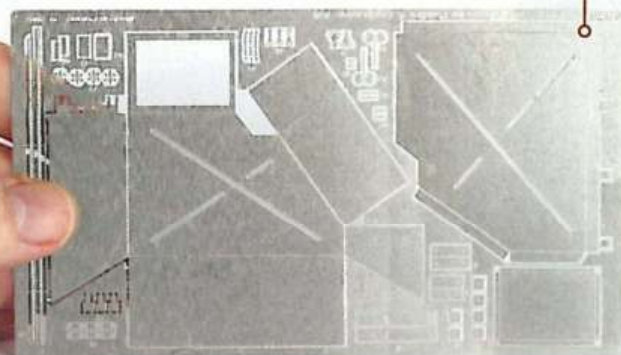


▲ Call sign I8D, on one of the two Squadron Taurus ARV's, takes on supplies during a combat operation in July 2007. The Taurus is seen carrying a complete Leopard power pack, spare road wheels, and spare idler wheels.

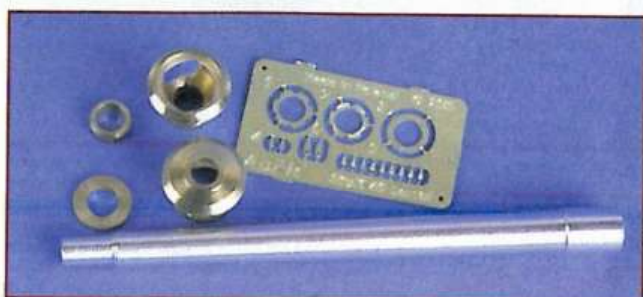

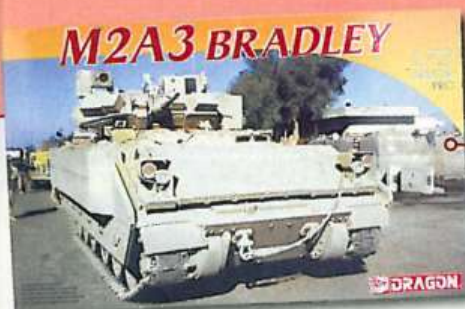

Another Bradley release from Dragon and following on from their earlier release of the M3A2, this time the M2A3 with its distinctive Commanders Independent Thermal Viewer (CITV) mounted on the turret rear and a set of Explosive Reactive Armour (ERA). This kit comprises of 158 plastic parts, 11 etched brass and 22 DS100 parts including a set of tracks. As we have come to expect from Dragon the parts are crisply moulded and highly detailed. Highlights of which include, finely moulded mesh engine grilles, the ERA arrays are nicely done with tiny bolt head detail, the gunners Doghouse site can be depicted open or closed, the extra roof armour and the six part CITV is also well done. All hatches apart from the gunners can be depicted open and the only gripe some modellers may have with this kit is the fact that most of the tools are moulded onto the hull although in my opinion these are well done. Four marking options are included with this kit, three from units serving in Iraq and one based in Fort Irwin California, all finished in overall desert sand. Overall another cracking kit from Dragon. Recommended.

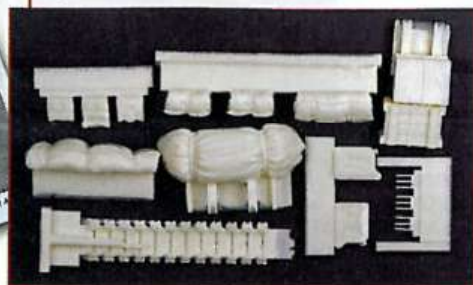

Now ICM have released a brand new tooling of this light armoured car. This tiny kit comprises of 55 plastic parts and two etched brass parts. This kit is crisply moulded and well detailed. Highlights include separately moulded tools, tiny towing hooks, very finely moulded main gun and secondary machine gun and the etched brass anti-grenade screen is also nicely done. Some modellers may bemoan the fact that their is no internal detail although you cannot see much past the main gun and some of the parts are so tiny that care will need to be taken when removing from the sprue. Only two marking options are included, one finished in overall sand and serving with the Afrika Korps and the other in overall panzer grey serving in Russia, although the decal sheet is a generic one and includes a lot of markings for the spare box. Overall a smashing little kit, recommended.

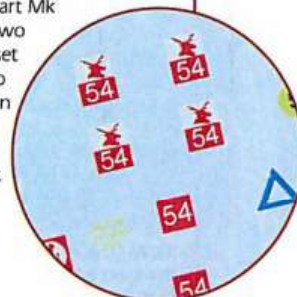

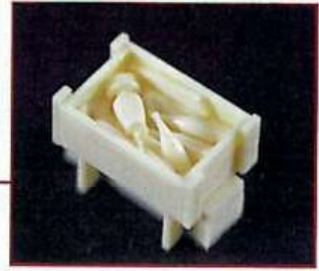

Techniques

MAKING SIMPLE GROUNDWORK PART 3

This month we will carry on adding the various grasses to the scene.



The next stage is to add the longer Heki Wild grass to selected areas. The idea is to vary the length of the grass for a natural look, if you only use one length of grass the scene will end up looking more like a garden lawn!



The Heki Wild grass is now in place, and again the excess is removed by gently tapping the base. The bottom right corner has not been covered as this is where the hanging basket liner will be glued on.



To fix the basket liner in place, PVA is applied straight from the bottle without any thinning.



The PVA is then spread out using a wide flat paint brush.



A piece of basket liner has now been cut to size. Note that it has been glued on upside down, this will be made clear later.



The liner needs to be pressed down firmly, then held in place with a suitable weight. When laying the grass over a contoured surface, low tack masking tape can be used to hold the liner down while the glue sets.



After the glue has been left to dry fully, the woven backing material can be carefully pulled away to reveal the grass.



This long grass can now be trimmed to the required length suitable for the scene.
